Sheridan College goes to Limehouse

Limehouse will be buzzing with activity this fall. A planning committee consisting of Limehouse residents, staff members of the Limehouse Public School along with representatives from Sheridan College's Community Services department have planned and organized a fall and winter learning program which caters to almost every hobby, craft and general interest.

Courses ranging from gardening, to nutrition will be offered in the Limehouse Public School and in the Sheridan College Craft trailer, which will be located on the school grounds. Organized are 18 courses in gardening, painting in oils and water colors, ceramics, weaving, macramé, quilting, photography, parapsychology, stitchery, real estate, nutrition and small engine repair and maintenance. The courses will be of either five or ten-session duration, depending on the course chosen.

The 47-foot trailer is a mobile studio equipped with potters wheels, a kiln, glaze laboratory, looms and other miscellaneous craft supplies.

Registration for the courses can be made either by mail or in person at the trailer open house which will be held Monday September 29 from 1 p.m. to 9 p.m.
