Visitors dominate

Fourteen teams, seven from the Georgetown Industrial Fastball League and seven out-of-town teams, took part this past weekend in the Glen Williams annual Industrial Fastball Tournament. The tournament was spread over two days and when the dust finally settled last Sunday night, an out-of-town team, Erin took home the championship silverware. Erin defeated Perks in the championship game 11-4.

For Perks, it was something of a bitter pill to swallow as they had to settle for the runner-up spot last year when they were downed by Norval in the championship final. The local team, which played perhaps its best tournament of the year, just ran out of steam in the crucial contest and from the fifth inning on it was obvious that Erin had the game well in hand.

The luck of the draw went against Perks as they were forced to play three games on Sunday, while Erin, who gained a bye into the semi-finals played only two games. The final result could possibly have been reversed if the bye had gone to Perks but as it was, Bob Fendley was forced to pitch in all three of Sunday's games. (Perk's second pitcher, Wayne McNiven was bothered by a sore arm) and the toll on his arm began to tell in the third inning of the final game.

To Erin's credit, they beat Curwood and Club Billiards to reach the final and were probably the best balanced ball team in the tournament. Their pitchers came through when called upon, they showed power at the plate and the team's defensive work could not be faulted.

The big upset of the tournament occurred in one of Sunday's semi-finals as Club Billiards beat the Glen and their ace pitcher, Jeff Haines, on the basis of base runners. The game was tied 1-1 at the end of the regulation seven innings but when the base runner totals were tallied, Club Billiards, much to the delight of the team and quite a few of those fans present, were declared the winners.

How to tell what you've caught

Okay, I (or someone) made two mistakes in last week's column. The first one was right on the first line. A 4-5 foot tug should have been a 40-50 foot tug. Anyway it sure is a big one, and will be capable of taking an awful lot of Chinook Salmon. The second error?? Three Coho, two Chinook and one Kokanee makes more than the three fish limit. I am sure you would not take more than your fair share and blame it on me but I thought I had better clear it up now.

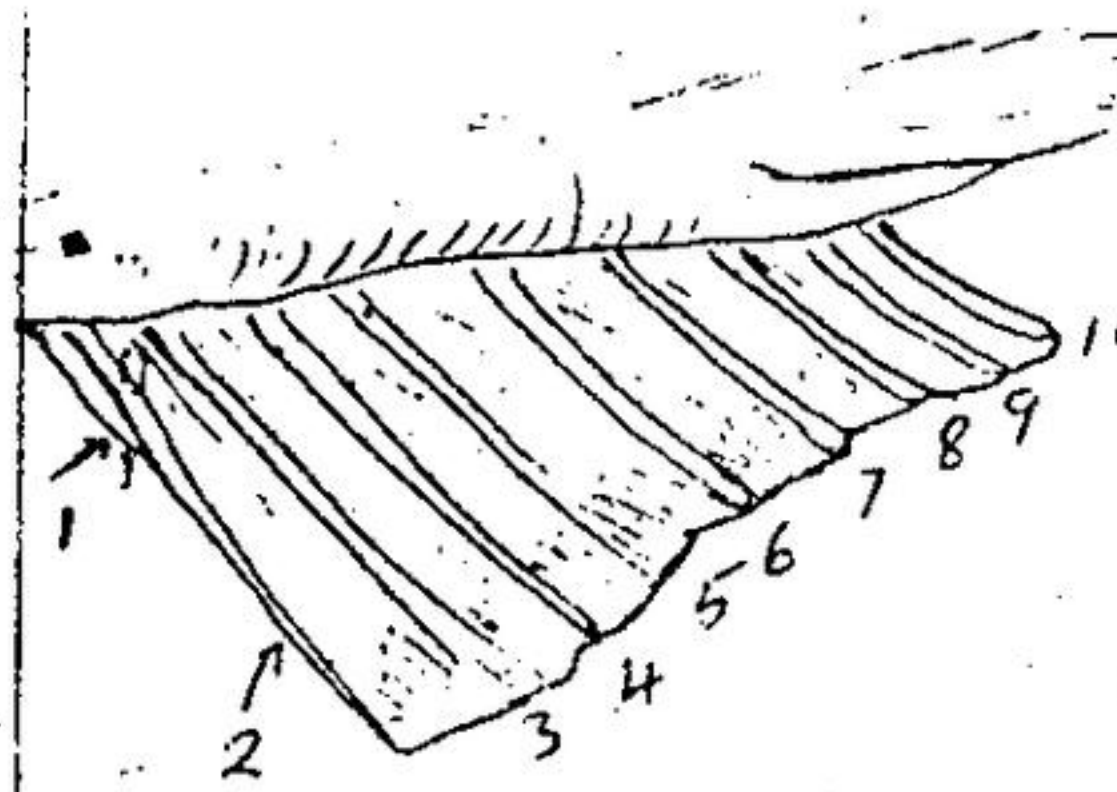
As you well know now by the photographs in the Herald last week of Harold and Jimmy Wittmeier of Mackenzie Drive, the Coho are here for sure. I had a chance to talk with Harold last week and they sure are proud of Jimmy's fish. This Coho weighed in at 14 pounds and they are having it mounted by Don Lewis of Georgetown.

Those three fish were a kind of reward for taking the time out to "Take a boy fishing," as the old saying goes. As it was the end of the summer and the young folk were heading back to school, Harold capped it off with a trip for the big Salmon. Harold's fishing buddy, Tony Rechichi, took two more for a boat total of five fish and none of them had lamprey scars. The day previous Tony took his limit of five on a fluorescent green floufish but Friday all they would take was the XSRFB which is fluorescent red with black dots. Take your boy fishing, maybe you will do as well.

If it gets hot (the weather) the fish will move back into the lake again till it cools off. If you are going to be out in a boat make sure it is serviceable for the conditions under which you will be fishing. The Coast Guard will haul any boats off the lake if they deem them unsafe.

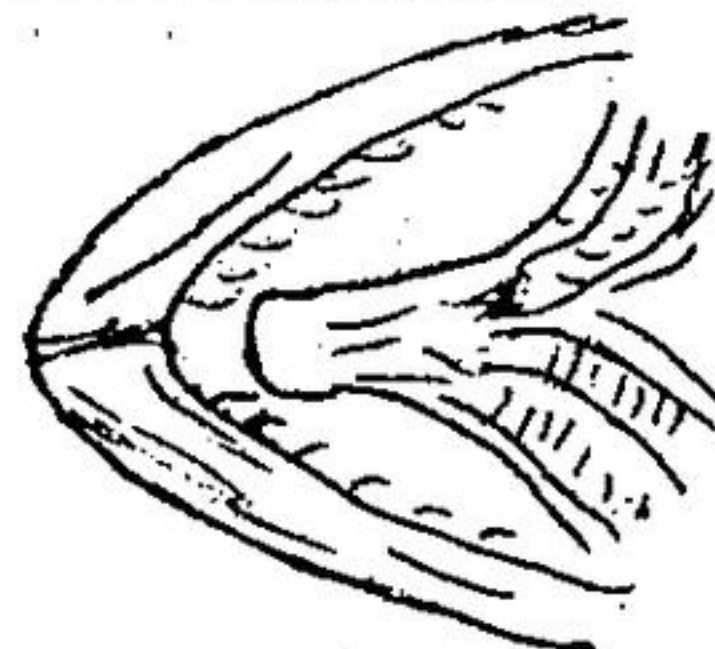
The Credit River between the Queen Elizabeth Hwy. and Number 5 Hwy. is closed to fishing. This week I am enclosing a sketch which will help to identify the fish you catch. It can be tricky, and may surprise you to learn that at times even experts are not sure.

Atlantic Salmon have 9 rays in the Anal fin, Chinook have 15 to 17, Coho have 13 to 15, Rainbow Trout 10 to 12, Brook Trout 9 to 10, Lake Trout 10 to 11. I feel that there are too many variables to use this method and another alternative is the colour of the mouth.

Brown and Lake Trout, along with Atlantic Salmon, have similar mouths but are identifiable by their tails. The Chinook has an entire black mouth inside, the Coho has the mouth part black and the gums grey, the Rainbow Trout has an all white mouth. Also the tails are somewhat different on some of these fish, and if you put these things together you will get sure identity of the fish you have. It is not as complicated as you may think.

Remember, Lake Trout is closed in some areas and Brook, Brown and Lake Trout closed in many areas September 15. Make sure you know what species of fish you have as ignorance is no excuse of the law. Your 1975 fishing regulations are still in effect till the end of this year and even into the new year in some cases. Don't throw it away yet. There are more than Salmon to fish for yet.

Some of the hunting seasons start soon, and by that time every hunter should have his licence and set of the regulations and know where they are in effect and for what species. Also study the gun laws in the area where you reside or intend to hunt. Join the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters and support your sport in ONTARIO OUTDOORS.

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
