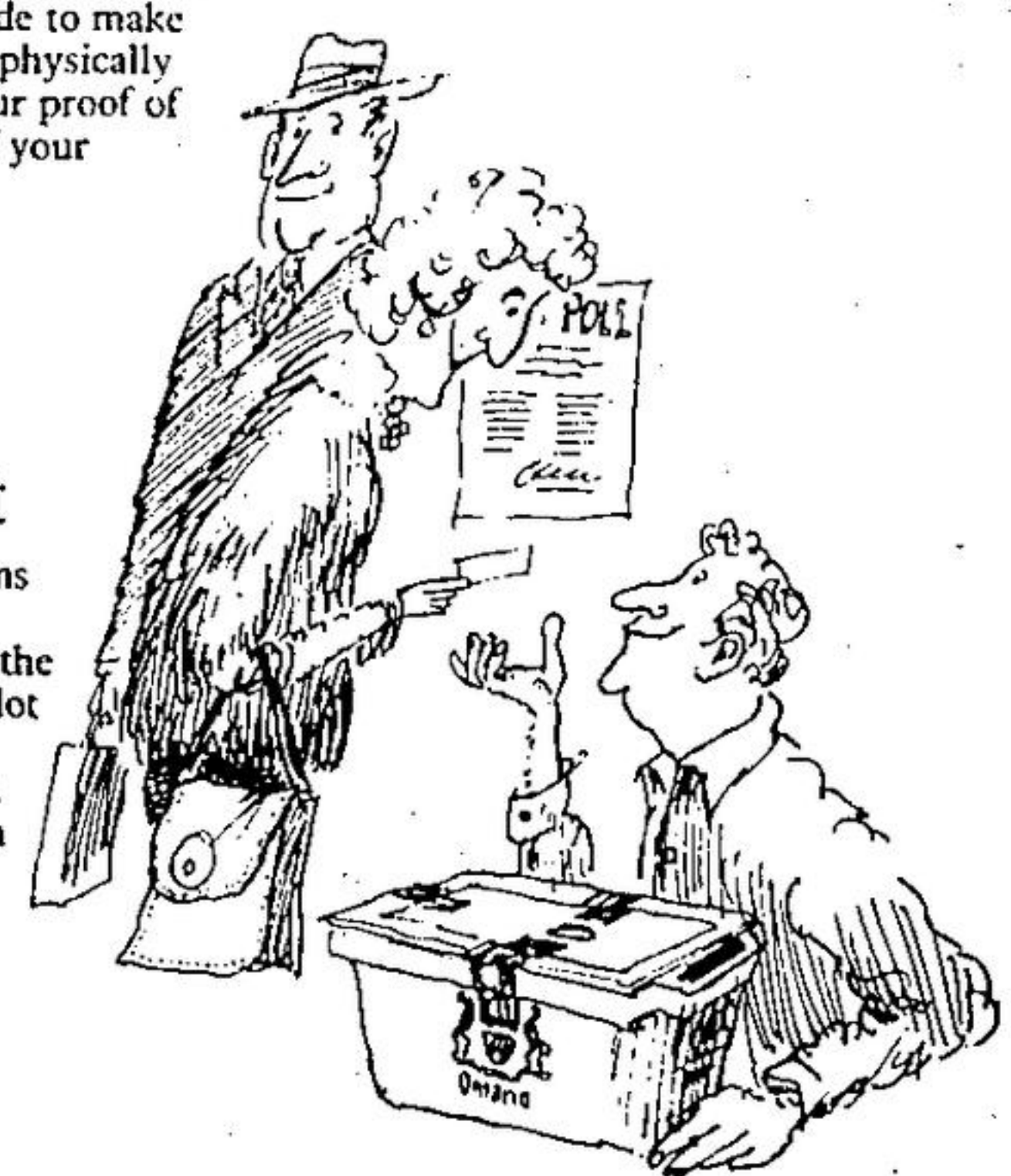
X marks the spot on election day, September 18

If your name is on the list of voters, you have the right to vote in this Ontario Provincial Election. To make it as convenient as possible, the polling places in each district are centrally located in your area. An attempt has also been made to make polling places as accessible as possible for physically handicapped and elderly voters. Check your proof of enumeration, Form 103, for the address of your polling place.

On Election Day, September 18, your polling station will be open 9.00 a.m. to 8.00 p.m. EDT.

Marking Your Ballot

On the wall of each polling place, directions for marking your ballot will be in plain view. If you have any other questions, ask the person who gives you your ballot. The ballot resembles the one illustrated below, with the candidates' names listed alphabetically. Vote for only one candidate by marking an X in the circle, after the name.
