first inning, added two more in the third frame then counted four more runs in the fourth inning to put the game out of reach. The eventual winners exploded for eight more runs


in the sixth inning to insure the All told, the Georgettes left 18 base runners stranded and although they collected 11 hits. failed to produce when the


