Hillsburgh and the weather cool Georgettes

It was a cold, dank night in more ways than one for the Georgettes in last Tuesday's Championship game of the Halton Ladies Softball League. The game was played in Hillsburgh and, had southsayers been employed by the Georgettes, chances are the game would have been called off before the first pitch was thrown.

All previous games in Hillsburgh had an 8:30 start but because of the lateness of the season, this final game had been scheduled for 8:00 p.m. As this starting time rolled around, only six Georgettes were going through their warmup paces, while the Hillsburgh team were set and ready to go. Just prior to game time, a flock of ducks was spotted winging their way south through the crisp night air and perhaps the local squad would have been best advised to follow their lead and return on a warmer, better-omened evening.

As it was, the game was played and Hillsburgh made it two league championships in a row as they soundly defeated the Georgettes, 16-1.

It was a disappointing end to what was a successful year for the Armstrong Georgettes as they finished second, behind Hillsburgh, in regular league play with a ten-win and six-loss record and performed well in the final series extending the defending league champions to the full five games before bowing out.

Tuesday's game did not get out of hand until the fourth inning and with a little bit of luck on the Georgette's behalf, the complexion of the contest could easily have been changed in the early innings. The Georgettes managed six hits and had one run across by the third inning but the telling statistic was the seven base runners left stranded and the potential runs that were never realized.

Hillsburgh did not fall victim to this fate as they pushed two

runs across the plate in the first inning, added two more in the third frame then counted four more runs in the fourth inning to put the game out of reach. The eventual winners exploded for eight more runs in the sixth inning to insure the victory.

All told, the Georgettes left 18 base runners stranded and although they collected 13 hits, failed to produce when the runs were there for the taking. Ev Metler took the loss for the Georgettes, while Marilyn Eagles was credited with the Hillsburgh win.

Two outstanding defensive plays were made in the game, one by Georgette centerfielder, Goldie Cash, and one by Hillsburgh right fielder, Nancy Rhynold. With two out in the third and a Hillsburgh runner on first, Nancy Rhynold looped a long ball to right centre, which Goldie snared after covering a fair piece of acreage.

In the top of the fourth inning, Nancy got her revenge as

she made a neat, shoe-top catch on what appeared to be a sure hit by the Georgette's Elaine Lewis.

With Hillsburgh collecting 18 hits, obviously the team hit well, but two players in particular contributed to the club output. Centrefielder, Janice Gagne, hit three-for-four and knocked in four runs, while catcher Mary Bullock picked up two hits but also drove in four runs. For the Georgettes, Ev Metler was two-for-four, including a double and a triple, while both Pat Walsh and Susan Fredette chipped in

Lewis, McCauley head NHL Officials group

The National Hockey League's Officials Association held its election of officers recently and the Georgetown area placed three of its residents in executive positions.

Bryan Lewis, of Georgetown, very well known in local hockey circles, was elected Association President. John McCauley of Georgetown was elected treasurer and Ian Wicks of Brampton was elected vice-president. The fourth member of the newly formed executive was Don Hoggarth of Barrie who takes over as Secretary.

Both Lewis and McCauley are entering their ninth years as professional officials. They were hired when the NHL initiated its expansion plans. Lewis is beginning his fifth year as an NHL referee.

In the past several years, Bryan has been averaging 75 league games, eight exhibition contests as well as handling roughly eight to ten playoff games.

The second and most revolutionary change will allow officials to reply publicly when attacks are made on their competency and integrity.
