Delays kill Royalettes

For the Georgetown Royalettes, the adage "a rest is as good as a cure" proved sheer poison as the girls lost their best two-out-of-three Halton Juvenile Girls League playoff series to Eringate two games straight and thus are finished barring exhibition games - for this summer.

The Royalettes started out strong this past season and were challenging league leaders, Alderwood for the top spot up until the last few regularly scheduled games. Then, their hitting dropped off and an uncommon number of errors began to crop up. The girls were plagued by these maladies into provincial play and were subsequently eliminated by Alderwood.

League play was postponed until after the provincial playdowns had been completed but then inclement weather added up to the enforced idleness and, apart from practice time, the Royalettes were separated from softball for at least three weeks.

Eringates won the first

game of the playoffs 12-9 and it was untimely errors that cost the local nine the win. The Royalettes were leading 6-4, after three innings but then fell apart as Eringate counted eight runs in the fourth and fifth innings to build up an insurmountable lead.

The Royalettes did rally for three runs in their half of the seventh inning but it was just a case of too little too late. Laura Wilkes was charged with the loss, while D. Baker picked up the Eringate win.

The Royalettes' bats were hot as they struck for the nine runs and two major contributors were Betty Marchment, who hit four-for-four and Charlene Milton who was two-for-three at the plate.

The error epidemic was under control for most of the second game against Eringate, but a lapse in the sixth inning allowed Eringate to score three runs and jump into a 9-7 lead. The Royalettes could manage but one run in their half of the seventh and dropped the game 9-8 and the series.

Betty Marchment started the game for the Royalettes but was relieved by Laura Wilkes in the third inning. Laura was charged with the loss. The pick of the Royalette hitters in this game were Betty Marchment and Margo Butler.

This past weekend the Royalettes competed in the Alderwood Juvenile Girls Softball Tournament a tourney which attracted 16 of the top juvenile girls softball teams from throughout southern Ontario - and displayed the type of inconsistency that has been troubling them in the dying weeks of the summer.

Marg Butler hit a homerun with a runner on in the first game win, while Janet McKay went four-for-five at the plate. In the second game the team hitting again slumped as they managed only one run.
