Wild times as Coho start run

By Bob Ollivier. Member, Outdoor Writers of Canada You think it's bad at Thornbury and Owen Sound in the spring??? Atleast these fishermen are on foot. Put all these people in boats and the full impact of the "Coho Fever" will hit you.

The mouth of the Credit River is jammed. The boat slips that are available have a line-up waiting to put boats in. No place to park your car. Some folks from Georgetown even went down Friday night and put their boat in and slept in the boat, in order to have that edge over everyone

Ron Wagstaff, Sargent Road, and I went down to Port Credit Saturday arriving about 6.30 in the morning. Not having a trailer to put the boat in, we just picked it up and set in, avoiding the crowds. Common sense and respect for the rights of others will help avoid some of the scenes of impatience.

This is an excellent opportunity to learn some of the rules of boat safety, "rules of the road" so to speak. Know what side of a marker buoy to stay on and watch out for the other guy. Out in the lake there were about 500 boats of all styles and size, ranging from 40-foot cruisers to sailboats to canoes. All with lines out trolling for the Coho Salmon that were there in schools of several hundred fish.

- No sooner were we out of the harbour area then we saw a boat with a fish on. We did not stop our trolling pattern as it was not the time to bother them with questions and our presence would have made the landing of the fish that much more difficult. Everywhere we looked people were fighting fish, or it seemed that way to us.

Every boat we could check had red fluorescent flatfish on, or the occasional one with a "fire plug" lure, but these were all in red fluorescent.

- Some other effective lures to try are the Toby spoon, Mepps Rainbow spinners, or try anything you feel may take them.

The boats were out in the area around the Credit River mouth although they were spread out quite well.

Think Safety: Those idiots out in canoes were asking for trouble. It blew up with a storm coming from shoreward and the wind getting quite strong. When the rain hit it seemed that everyone was heading for the shore and the cance caught in the wake of a big boat doesn't stand much chance. The waves were starting to get high.

Remember to show all those watching you that fishermen and women are people with respect and responsibility. Last year brought us a bad name. Let's erase it this year, and still get in on the excitement of the

Yes we put fish in the boat. Ron Wagstaff put a ninepound Coho in that measured 28 inches. This fish smashed a brand new X5 Flatfish to the point that the lure is now only good for a souvenir.

If you fish is a female, keep the eggs. They make great balt for Rainbow Trout fishing. I don't agree with using eggs but no one can argue with the method of obtaining them. If these eggs were to flood the market the need for poachers and illegally taken rainbow eggs would totally disappear.

Coho and Rainbow are both taken consistently on spoons in Michigan, and remember that Rainbow Trout fishing is not at its peak yet. They are better in October. By the way, if you get a Salmon with a lamprey mark don't let it bother you. Cook the fish anyway and cut out the scarred section before eating. If you happen to catch the lamprey itself, it too is good eating.

Brook Trout Season is closing in our area on Sept. 30 this year instead of the usual Sept. 15. The same goes for the Rainbow Trout.

Remember about hunting licences and the need for township licences and keep in touch with ONTARIO OUTDOORS.
