Church Street townhouses set for work

Plans to renovate the four townhouse units located on Church Street between Main and Market Streets, plus add on two more units, have been passed on to the town's planning department for a full study.

The action was taken last week by the subsidiary planning board upon hearing of plans for the building presented by lawyer Walter Sopinka.

Representing the owner of the property, Mr. Sopinka told the board that plans for the four present units centre mainly on renovating the exterior, including replacement of the existing porches. "The interiors of the buildings, for

the most part, are in very good condition," he added.

The additional units, Mr. Sopinka continued, would be added to the east of the present four. "They would be designed to fit in with the existing units."

"Those units are estimated to be somewhere in the range of 100 years old," noted Mr. Sopinka. "By improving-



them we could add a tremendous asset to the downtown area."

Councillor Ern Hyde, however, didn't agree. "Those buildings should never have been allowed in the first place," he said noting that they were set back just over six feet from the street which is well under the town's

minimum standards, 'What we have now is sufficient." "When you start talking about those present buildings being of some historical significance I can only feel that we would be better off without that part of our history."

Councillor Roy Booth explained that by granting approval for the addition to the town buildings the town would have an opportunity to have the present four buildings up-graded.

"We're not going to be improving the situation by putting up one bit of iron railing," Councillor Hyde replied.
"That won't improve that building one lots."

The planning board agreed that a more complete study by the planning department should be carried out prior to any decision being made.
