

Brelsford inducted

Mountainview Baptist Church officially welcomed Reverend Tom Brelsford to the ministry of the church in an induction service held Tuesday evening, September 23.

The Mountainview congregation was joined for the evening by several delegates and ministers from the Guelph association, as well as by ministers from other Georgetown churches.

Mr. D. L. Kropf, moderator of the Guelph Association of Baptist Churches, led the service in charging the new minister and the congregation with their mutual responsibilities in the service of God.

Both minister and congregation promised to aid each other in the proclamation of the saving gospel of Jesus Christ and to work together for His glory in the church.

The Scripture reading, Luke 5: 1-11 was given by Reverend Dan Sydney of Acton Baptist Church and Georgetown Baptist Christian Fellowship and was followed by the introduction of the minister by Mr. A. Robson, chairman of the Mountainview Church's Board of Deacons.

Mr. Russell Loit, chairman of the department of ministry for the Baptist convention gave the prayer of induction and the word of God was proclaimed in song by the singing group 'His Image' and the Mountainview Church choir.

The main part of the service, a sermon entitled 'Shore-bound Christians', given by Reverend Norman J. Bullock, minister of Egerton Baptist Church, London, stressed the need for Christians to allow Jesus Christ to infiltrate their

everyday lives and answer their daily problems. Too often, he stated, we tend to think that God belongs in Church on Sunday, when instead, He wants to change and help us in our day to day tasks. Christians also need to learn in return to areas where they have failed, he said, and trust God to work in that situation.

Following the sermon, Reverend Brelsford gave the closing prayer and Benediction and then the congregation adjourned to the lower auditorium for refreshments and greetings from various local representatives.

Prior to coming to Georgetown Reverend Brelsford served the communities of Mounsbury and Westover while studying at McMaster Divinity College. Having given his life to

Christ shortly after leaving high school, Reverend Brelsford decided to enroll in the Toronto Bible College - now Ontario Bible College - and to further his education later enrolled in the English and Philosophy program at McMaster University where he graduated with honors.

A seven-year career as a high school teacher followed with the most recent position being with the Toronto District Christian High School in Woodbridge where he was introduced to a number of Georgetown students.

On June 17 he was ordained. Reverend Brelsford and his wife Joanne and their daughter Eve look forward to not only serving the church but, through the church, to giving fuller service to the Georgetown community.

At the University of Guelph, Dorothy Hogan conducted the 'Madrigal Singers' and produced numerous classical, folk-rock concerts, including a ten-week series of workshop on folk music entitled 'Folk Scene '79'.

Dorothy Hogan did her graduate work at Westminster Choir College in Princeton, New Jersey where she received a Master of Music degree, specializing in choral conducting. Currently she is organizing tours for her Maple Sugar Troupe to bring Canadian folk music to communities across Canada.

Bolivian foster child

A very special commitment has been made by a member of our community, Mrs. T. Reed of Georgetown who has joined Foster Parents Plan.

Mrs. Reed has 'adopted' little Julia Quenta seven-years old who lives in Bolivia. Mrs. Reed's monthly contribution of \$17 brings material and financial assistance to both child and family and is aimed at strengthening the family unit by helping each member. \$17 a month provides the family with a monthly cash grant, distribution of goods such as vitamins, blankets, towels, soap and other useful items. Medical and dental care, the sustained guidance and counselling of social workers and the benefit of special programs are also available from the monthly contribution.

A strong emphasis is placed on education. All Foster children (and their brothers and sisters, if possible) must attend school. Vocational training courses are available to Foster children, their brothers and sisters and in some cases, their parents. The aim is to give the family tools to help them become independent and self-supporting. Special programs adapted to the needs of each country also meet these aims.

Foster Parents Plan is currently working in eleven countries in South America, Asia and Africa. Over 60,000 children are currently being aided by individuals, groups and families in Canada, the United States, Australia and the Netherlands.

Thanksgiving service at historic church

The historic 'White Church' south of Bellefontain will be opened by the Credit Valley Conservation Authority for its second annual Thanksgiving Service at 2 p.m., Sunday, October 12.

Reverend Bob Rumble, minister at the Evangelical church for the Deaf will conduct the Thanksgiving service. Mr. Rumble is a resident of Caledon.

The old church, known as Melville United Church for many years, is located about four miles south of Bellefontain

on the Fourth Line West in Caledon. It was built in 1837 by the Scottish settlers in Caledon and, early in its history, served as a meeting place for worshippers from Highway 10 to Erin.

The church was closed in 1965 and turned over to the Credit Valley Conservation Authority in 1969 for preservation.

Last Thanksgiving the church was overflowing with the 150 people who attended and joined in the old-time harvest home service.
