Last Sunday's soccer scores spelled both good and bad news for Georgetown Falcons Fans. The bad news was the Georgetown Falcons loss against Neerlandia at Cedarvale Park. Neerlandia went ahead 2-0 early in the

game. The first goal on a penalty shot. Ken Chapman shot the Falcons back in the game with a low shot from the right, however Neerlandia scored two more goals before Ken Ross scored the second for the Falcons on a penalty kick. Neerlandia added one more late in the game to make it final 5-2. This was the last league

game for the Falcons who dropped into fourth place in the league standings.

The good news came from other games played last Sunday. Hansa Int. of Brampton failed to overtake the Falcons, losing their final game to Oakville 4-2. In Keeladale Park, C.S.I. defeated Lazio 1-0. Toronto

Lazio had a chance to gain enough points to pull into a third place tie with Hansa but after losing Sunday and with two games remaining Lazio could make it in a fourth place tie with the Falcons. The only but serious threat to the Falcons if Renaissance. Their last game will be against Lazio. A win will give Renaissance sole possession of fourth place, while a tie will bring them even with the Falcons. A loss will leave them in a fifth place tie with Hansa.

Regardless of what happens, the Falcons did very well. In last Sunday's game the team was without goalkeeper Mike Deere and Robert Lister, due to university commitments. It was good to see Gary Miller and Ken Ross, who are attending London University and were not sure if they could make the game. We must agree that University comes first and in no way will we

blame these players for not showing. We hope to have many of these players back next year. We should however build a second team to be entered into another division or league to prevent the fear of a player shortage. In last Sunday's game, Mike Osborne, from the Georgetown Jr. Bantam, and Bill Higgins from Acton, who was signed by the Falcons two days previous to the game, were in the lineup. One familiar face who will not be back with the Falcons next year is coach George Baines, who resigned after last Sunday's game. It is sometimes frustrating to be a coach, Manager of Official of a Senior team and at times we all feel like quitting. However, it is good to know that there are individuals who always seem to carry on and should be back for the next soccer season.

Turkey shooting season is here! Or at least the time when the local clubs hold Turkey shoots. What better way to get a ready plucked and cleaned turkey than to win it at one of these shooters get together.

That minuscule circle of white card that seems so far away is only 30 yards, and the number of pellets in the circle shows your score. One thing we learned this weekend was to know your gun before going out.

If your gun is new, shoot a few targets first or borrow someone else's, it is within the rules. The opening of the hunting season in this area was not the best day to hold a shoot I thought but the Georgetown Revolver club put it on any way and seemed to do alright, with lots of shooters and plenty of spectators.

I was pleased to see many women and young people taking part in the contest. Next weekend is the Georgetown Fall Fair, and another poor day for a shoot but the Georgetown Anglers and hunters are holding one at their club house on the 8th line one mile north of No. 5 side road. This will be at 12 noon, Saturday, Oct. 4.

Grouse, Partridge and squirrel opened along with the duck season last Saturday, although the grouse were few and far between. Maybe as the season progresses, and the opening day hunters are staying home things will improve.

I know of some sincere hunters who went to Luther Marsh at noon on the Friday in order to get hunting. Considering that the season did not open there till 11 a.m. the next day, it sure was a long wait. I hope they were not disappointed.

Pot holes are not places to put pot-or are they? The

Ministry of Natural Resources recently found marijuana growing on one of the development areas.

They had planted wildlife foods and shrubs and when they went to check the growth, the strange plant was discovered. Apparently someone thought the isolated area would not be discovered. The section had been dredged for pot holes and the plants were placed to prevent erosion.

These areas are being prepared in many parts of Ontario and should prove beneficial to many forms of wildlife.

The news is out! The dam at Streetsville is going out. This leaves the one at Georgetown and of course the one at Norval. This one is supposedly privately owned and is being built up again to full height.

However, Julian Reed, the new MP for the area who owns the land on both sides of the dam and the river, must have an overseer from the Credit Valley Conservation Authority and the Ministry of Natural Resources, while any work is being undertaken.

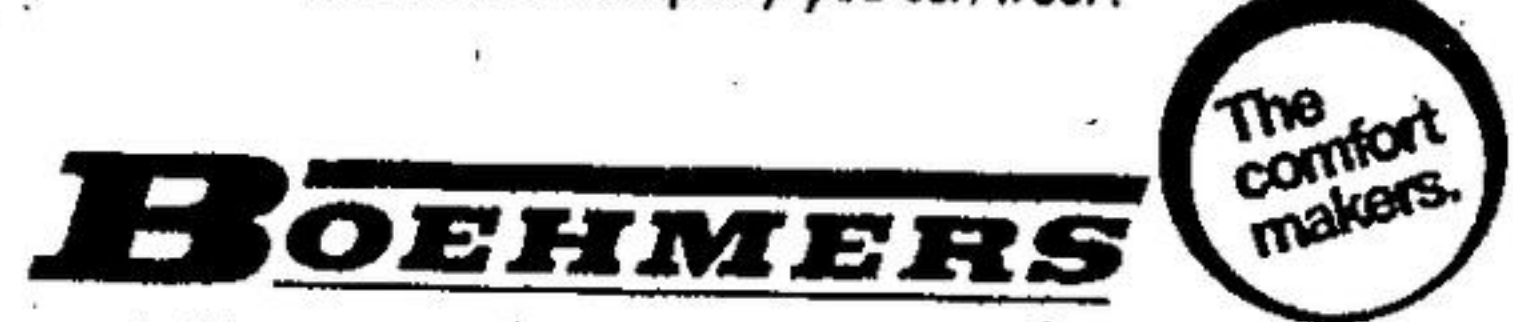
