Notice of Application to the Ontario Municipal Board by the Corporation of the Town of Halton Hills for approval of a By-law to regulate Land Use passed pursuant to Section 35 of the Planning Act.

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of The Corporation of the Town of Halton Hills intends to apply to the Ontario Municipal Board pursuant to the provisions of Section 35 of the Planning Act for approval of by-law 75-74 passed on the 21st day of August, 1975. A copy of the by-law is furnished herewith. A note giving an explanation of the purpose and effect of the by-law and stating the lands affected thereby, is also furnished herewith.

ANY PERSON interested may, within fourteen (14) days after the date of this notice, send by registered mail or deliver to the Clerk Administrator of The Corporation of the Town of Halton Hills notice of his objection to approval of the said by-law together with a statement of the grounds of such objection.

ANY PERSON wishing to support the application for approval of the by-law may within fourteen (14) days after the date of this notice send by registered mail or deliver to the Clerk Administrator of The Corporation of the Town of Halton Hills notice of his support to approval of the said by-law together with a request for notice of any hearing that may be held, giving also the name and address to which such notice should be given.

THE ONTARIO MUNICIPAL BOARD may approve of the said by-law, but before doing so it may appoint a time and place when any objection to the by-law will be considered. Notice of any hearing that may be held will be given only to persons who have filed an objection or notice of support and who have left with or delivered to the Clerk Administrator undersigned, the address to which notice of hearing is to be sent.

THE LAST DATE for filing objections will be October 16th, 1975. DATED at the Town of Halton Hills this 1st day of October, 1975.

THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF HALTON HILLS By-Law No. 75 - 74

A BY-LAW TO AMEND ZONING BY-LAW 57-91, AS AMENDED, OF THE FORMER TOWN OF GEORGETOWN, NOW THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF HALTON HILLS.

WHEREAS Council for the Corporation of the Town of Halton Hills deems it necessary and advisable to amend Zoning By-law 57-91 for the former Town of Georgetown, now the Town of Halton Hills, by changing the zone designation of the lands outlined on the plan attached to this By-law as Schedule "A" from Industrial Second Density (M2) to Residential Third Density (R3).

NOW THEREFORE, THE COUNCIL FOR THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF HALTON HILLS HEREBY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. By-law No. 57-91 for the Corporation of the Town of Halton Hills (formerly the Corporation of the Town of Georgetown) is hereby amended by the addition thereto of a section to be known as Section 13.4 which said section shall read as follows:

"13.4 Schedule "A" is amended by changing the zone designation of those lands outlined on the plan attached to this By-law as Schedule "A" from Industrial Second Density (M2) to Residential Third Density (R3)."

2. This By-law shall become effective on the date of passing hereof subject to receiving the approval of the Ontario Municipal Board.

By-law read a first and second time this 5th day of August 1975.

THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF HALTON HILLS Amendment to Zoning By-law 57-91 by By-law 73-74

Council for The Corporation of the Town of Halton Hills deems it necessary and advisable to amend zoning by-law 57-91 (of the former Town of Georgetown) to change the zone designation of the lands shown as the shaded areas on Schedule "A" to by-law 73-74 from Industrial Second Density (M2) to Residential Third Density (R3).

Under zoning by-law 57-91 the uses which presently may be made of the property in accordance with its Industrial Second Density (M2) zoning are set out in Section 7.3.1.1. of the by-law and include the following uses:

"shops for the repair, assembly or manufacture of small goods and wares, including parts for automotive bodies and similar items, laundries, printers, cleaners and dyers, storage warehouse, public garages and service stations, and manufacturing or industrial operations which are not obnoxious within enclosed structures or buildings."

If the zoning of the property under consideration is changed to Residential Third Density (R3) the uses which may then be made of the lands are set out in Section 5.2.3.1. of zoning by-law 57-91 and include the following uses:

"single family detached dwellings, public, separate, and high schools, churches, parks and playgrounds operated by the Town of Halton Hills and accessory uses including private garages and television antennae."

The lands immediately to the south of the property being rezoned are used for industrial purposes; the lands to the east are used for agricultural and residential purposes; the lands to the north are used for industrial purposes; and the lands to the west are used for residential purposes.

If by-law 73-74 is approved by the Ontario Municipal Board the zone designation of the lands as Residential Third Density (R3) will be in conformity with the Official Plan in force for the property under consideration.
