'Put up or shut up': Morrow shouts Council 'accessories to robbery': Sykes

Neglecting the shouts of Councillor Ric Morrow who demanded he "Put up or shut up", Councillor Ernie Sykes again brought up the matter of the Budokan Club's lease arrangement with the town for the Rose Room at the Georgetown Memorial Arena. Council had discussed the entire matter during its committee of the whole meeting the night before at which they decided to uphold the general administration committee's stand that the Budokan club's rent arrears amounting to approximately \$3,000 be forgiven. In return the club would lose its exclusive use of the facilities at the old arena.

Resigns committee

Halton Hills' representation on the Regional Land Division Committee has changed, following the resignation last week of J. A. Montgomery. Desmond Morrow has been selected to replace Mr. Montgomery on the committee. Mr. Morrow is a resident of Esqueping. He sat on repairs and equipment, for two nights a week at a cost of \$10 a night or \$100 per month. As Councillor Sykes began to review the history of the conflict between the town's recreation department and the club, Councillor Morrow angrily interrupted. "This is the most unmitigated, disastrous bit of speaking by a councillor I have ever heard. You are the most delaying person I have ever seen in eight years on this council... What do you have that's new?"

Undeterred Councillor Sykes continued, "The Budokan Club is being ripped off by the members of the council through the recreation department." New information he had, said Councillor Sykes, showed that the Budokan club had previously told the recreation department that they would be willing to pay the past rent if they were allowed to retain exclusive control of the facilities as they have for the past three years. "But they were pretty well told that, if you don't like it, get out, but leave your mats behind," he said. The mats, because they are permanently fixed to the floor cannot be moved. "We are being accessories to robbery if we let this happen. We'll be taking, be coercion, their property away from them. Those mats belong to them... I don't want any part of it."

Bob Welch speaks to St. George's men Religion strengthens politics minister claims

There is an old joke about an elderly lady who visited the local cemetery regularly. She would walk through reading each of the headstones carefully until one day she came upon a new grave. The inscription on the headstone read "Here lies a politician and an honest man."

"The nerve of some people burying two men in the same grave," she exclaimed.

It is an old joke but it served to open a brief speech made by the province's culture and recreation minister, Robert Welch at last Tuesday's meeting of St. George's Anglican Church Men's Club.

Mr. Welch addressed the group not directly as a political representative but as Chancellor of the area diocese for the Anglican church.

He explained that it is quite possible to have an honest politician. "What is the role of a Christian in public?" questioned Mr. Welch.

For each of his actions there must be some sort of social

accountability and in all cases he will be judged accordingly. "Many doubt the compatibility of honesty and politics," explained Mr. Welch. "Politics is not the dimly-lit, smoke-filled room with shifty characters that people envision."

To be a Christian and a politician, he said, you must work out a relationship of values in practical terms. The best approach is through the teachings of Christ.

"Jesus summed things up in one thought, Love God with your whole being and love others as ourselves. "It takes imagination, in-

sight and sensitivity to incorporate God in our daily lives."

Constant creativity and in all interactions with people aids in becoming an effective representative of peoples' needs. People are all influenced by new action and the complexity of the changes.

"Today's government must meet these changes as more people want a say in the institution that governs their lives."

"Religion and politics can't be divorced," added Mr. Welch. "They are related to the same unit, the human being."

Politics can be strengthened by religion and religion deepened by politics. "It is the creative involvement that can create further insights," said Mr. Welch.

A goal taken from the scriptures sums it all up, "I am come that men might have life and that they may have it with all its fullness."

Each person must answer to society. They answer through

a democracy and as a Christian they answer through God. "Achieving consistency through a meaningful purpose in life by first answering to ourselves and not losing sight of religion in considering your own vocation in the light of your Christian vocation, all make a good Christian," stated Mr. Welch.
