Ontario Outdoors Poor hunting so far, but...

Duck hunting has been poor due to the good weather we have been having. I was out recently and did not even see a single grouse so things are not so good in that department either.

Once the leaves are gone though things should pick up as grouse will lose their tendency to hold, and will be more apt to bounce out and show you a target.

Most upland hunters have a tendency to use too large a shot size on Grouse. I have seen hunters use the same shell that they use on ducks, and wonder why they miss so often.

The fact is Grouse fly right through the shot pattern. With these birds the range is often less than 30 yards and 7 and one half size shot is usually adequate and will do an effective job with a more dense pattern. C.I.L. has a good system of shot shell loads with specific loads for ducks and upland game.

If you load your own shells then you probably have a good book on shot and powder specifics, but for those who buy all their loads if you are in doubt, buy low brass 7 and one half for all your grouse hunting. The only exception would be if the ranges were longer than normal, and in this case you should go to a number 6 shot.

For those who wish to carry only a single size shot then the choice would be number 6 again as this could be used for both upland game and ducks.

Pheasant season opens today (Oct. 15) in Division four (that's us) and division six (the area surrounding Toronto) and we have a three bird limit.

The biggest problem is to find three birds in the first place. We also have the Hungarian Partridge and Bobwhite Quail. Possibly the best place to find these birds is in the Wildlife Management Areas, which are maintained by the Ministry of Natural Resources. The Ministry plants feed such as corn, millet and wild grape, along with shrubs for shelter. Birds are stocked and maintained in some of these areas.



A Pollution Probe meeting which will be held on October 23 at 8 p.m. at the Georgetown and District High School will be covering areas of interest to fishermen of the Credit River. Al Walno of the ministry of natural resources will speak on the effects of sedimentation as a stream pollutant. The meeting will be held in room 144 and it no doubt will be a good meeting to attend.

Have you ever been to Pioneer Village north of Toronto? I went recently for the first time and was surprised to find that the gunsmith shop has a resident gunsmith all year. He actually makes guns on the premises and you can observe the making of one of these firearms from start to finish if you go often enough.

While I was there I took the opportunity to ask him about his craft and found that the one gun I was handling was made by him over a period of about four months and was sold before it was started at a cost of fifteen hundred dollars. That's right \$1,500.

However when it is considered that the gun was started from a flat piece of steel which is heated and hammered to its hexagonal shape, and the parts are all made in the shop there, including the stock, I guess that it is probably worth it.

QUESTION...should you eat Salmon when taken out of Lake Ontario???
