

Labor Council opposes Federal wage controls

The Brampton and District Labor Council has termed the federal government's new wage controls "unfair and unworkable" and will be strongly opposing the implementation of the new guidelines.

President of the BDLC, Bill Rannachan of Georgetown, explained that the controls hold no proposals to "deal with unwarranted price increases."

Quoting Prime Minister

Trudeau's statement Monday night that if its production costs should go down a company would be expected to lower its prices, Mr. Rannachan said, "We find that statement quite ludicrous... It is necessary for wage earners to accept the controls but when it comes to profits of big business the companies are expected to voluntarily reduce prices."

"Who is kidding who? This system of economic control that is being suggested has been tried out in the USA and Britain. It flops because the only real restrictions were on the wage earners. Prices of commodities continued to rise sky high, reaping more profits for big business and causing untold hardships to wage earners."

"The government is playing around the real problems of inflation."

"They refuse to recognize and tackle the real problems such as government handouts to corporations already reaping excessive profits, price fixing, increased mortgage rates and rent gouging."

"We in the labor council refuse to support the government's proposals that are so one-sided they can only cause further hardships to people on fixed incomes and those lower paid workers of our country."

of knapsacks and related camping gear in storage at the camp.

Vandals again returned to a Georgetown car club, this time damaging cars, lighting fixtures, a pop machine and numerous windows of the building. Former members of the club are suspected. Police are still investigating.

One chain saw was reported missing by workmen at Elkton Developments last week. One

bicycle was removed from the carrier on a car parked at Georgetown District High School.

A Bairdrow Crescent resident reported to police the theft of a car radiator from her car while it was parked at the high school. A Norval resident reports damage to the engine of his car after unknown persons broke into his car while parked on Weber Drive. A Georgetown man was

beaten on the face, chest and head resulting in a difficulty to breathe and headaches. Investigation of the beating continues.

An Arletta Street man was arrested and charged following an incident over the weekend. A prowler was observed standing at the side door of an Arletta Street home after the occupants had turned the lights out.
