Public hall bylaw far from ready

A model bylaw concerning public hall licensing has been hanging in the air for almost one year now and after Tuesday evening's general administration committee meeting it became apparent that its fate will not be soon decided.

The model bylaw submitted by Fire Chief Ken Buikema is based on the regulation bylaw on public hall licensing drawn up by the province.

There are two main purposes of this bylaw. We are still under the old Esquevas public hall licensing bylaw and it is a technical requirement under provincial legislation. Municipalities have to draw up their own public hall licensing bylaw and that particular statute is to be dealt with by the municipality," explained Chief Buikema.

However Chief Buikema pointed out that this is not his main purpose in drawing up the bylaw.

"The main purpose of this bylaw is to promote life safety

for public gatherings. When you are dealing with public safety everything has to be considered."

Councillor Roy Booth agreed that the bylaw is necessary, however sections which he did not agree with when the first model bylaw was proposed, were once again questioned by the councillor.

"Looking at this bylaw it's obvious that some of the halls, I can't say so much for Acton or some of the surrounding areas, but I know for many in Georgetown, that they will be illegal if this draft is carried through. They would be illegal by probably a very narrow margin however, they still would be illegal."

"I do agree that we need a bylaw but I think we will have to relax on certain parts of it," continued Councillor Booth.

Councillor Booth expressed concern over certain sections such as churches not requiring a licence when they rent out the hall, fire detection signals and the requirement of at least two fire exits.

"Sections of this bylaw places all responsibility on the fire chiefs. This leaves too much discretion on the fire chiefs' behalf. There is no reason why the fire chiefs should have so much discretionary power," concluded Councillor Booth.

Councillor Rick Morrow made the recommendation that the two fire chiefs, Chief Ken Buikema and Chief C. H. Holmes, reach a mutual agreement and together draw up a model bylaw.

Picket second in Erin show

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Artisans agree on Cedervale rent

An agreement among the recreation department, the general administration committee and the Credit Valley Artisans was finally reached at last Tuesday's committee meeting concerning the rental of the cottage at Cedervale.

A nominal rental fee of \$100 will be charged, due to the fact that the artisans, still a young group, are working under a small budget.

The small rental will allow the group to purchase necessary equipment such as a kiln, looms, easels, pottery wheels, etc. Necessary renovations to the cottage will

also cut into the artisans' budget.

The agreement stated that in the event that the artisans cease to exist, or in the event that they cease to serve the community and exist for the financial benefit of its members, the artisans will agree to donate equipment to the town to enable the town to continue service to the community.

right to use or rent the facility at times when the artisans aren't using the cottage.

The artisans will be working for and with the community in the areas of supplying courses and programs on various arts and crafts.
