"We ride because we love the sport and we love horses. Hunting is not a competitive sport, which is the beauty of it all," explained Major Charles Kindersly at the recent fox hunt of the Eglington-Caledon Hunt Club.

The hunt began at Fox Briar Farm, the 100 acre farm of the Pabet family of Ballinafad early Saturday morning with over 65 riders turning out for the event.

The Eglington-Caledon Hunt Club stages hunts every Wednesday and Saturday and approximately 60 percent of Saturday hunters were from the Ballinafad, Caledon area.

Major Kindersly, a resident of Caledon, is one of the three Masters of the unt and at the age of 75 rides every day and never misses a hunt. The hunts vary in duration, however the majority last anywhere from four to six hours. Major Kindersly who has "hunted all my life, at least as far back as I can femember," has been a Master since 1949.

"I did a great deal of hunting in England. In 1946 I built up my own hounds and once I got started I just couldn't let go. Around this area we are short of foxes so we often hunt hare, we never hunt deer as it was once suggested. If the hounds get on a deer scent we stop them.

"Hunting is my main hobby and we do it just for the sport of it, not for the catch," con-

Eric Wallace, also from Caledon, is the second Master for the club with Col. George Brown of Toronto as the club's Field Master. Professional huntsman is Brian Walter and his wife Jane is one of the professional "whipperinners".

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Snowmobiles can be great fun.

This is what Ontario is doing to help make sure they're sare run.



We now have new laws for motorized snow vehicles, usually known as snowmobiles.

All snowmobiles must be registered with Ontario's Ministry of Transportation and Communications. (If previously registered, they must be re-registered.) Registration is

Also, people who operate snowmobiles off their own property must now have a permit to do so. The fee for the annual permit is \$10.00. (The only exceptions are in certain designated areas of remote northwestern Ontario.)

Actually, complying with the new regulations is easy. You can re-register a previously-registered snowmobile - and obtain your annual permit - at any Ministry of Transportation and Communications license-issuing office in Ontario (where you get your automobile license).

If you buy a new snowmobile, the dealer must register it on your behalf within six days of the sale.

The number of your Registration Certificate must be attached to, or painted on, both sides of your snowmobile's hood in numbers 2" to 3" high, and must contrast with your snowmobile's colour to be easily seen.

Your permit will be affixed to your Registration Certificate and you will be given two adhesive stickers to affix to your snowmobile's hood according to directions.

That's all there is to it.

Do not drive your snowmobile anywhere (except on your own property) unless it has been registered and you have a permit.

Make certain that you know and observe all operating rules and safety regulations for snowmobiles and be sure to check local by-laws in the municipality where you use your snowmobile.
