## Fairground work 'is now or never'

The proposed change house and washroom facilities at the Georgetown Fairgrounds will likely be tabled, at least for 1975.

Determined not to close the matter, but finding the costs \$12,000 over budget, superintendent for recreation facilities for the town of Halton Hills Pat Sweeney, approached the contractor who agreed to reduce the cost by \$5,400 leaving the town with only a \$6,600 deficit.

The total cost of the project is estimated \$50,000 and with the 25 percent provincial grant totalling in the \$14,000 area the town had to match the remainder.

However it was the stern belief of the general administration committee at Monday's meeting that if the project did not get

underway this year it will never get off its feet.

"We are so close to it now and for two or three thousand dollars we have to fold the idea. No way. The timing is right and the price is right. If we lose this project now, once council sees this next year the price will have increased severely, and well they won't even look at the project because of the costs. It's now or never for this project," warned Councillor Ric Morrow.

It was recommended at the general administration committee meeting that additional funds be added to the 1976 budget and that the project be given an immediate go-ahead. Council will deal with that suggestion next Monday.

### Region wants it...

# \$28,250 backhoe refused

"We don't want it," Halton Hills and Milton councillors bluntly told the region's works committee Wednesday afternoon when presented with the news that a \$28,250 backhoe and loader was to be purchased -- at their municipalities' expense -- for regional sewer and water projects.

The first some northern councillors heard of the financing of the backhoe came Wednesday during heated discussion of a works committee report that a \$28,250 tender for the piece of equipment be accepted and the backhoe ordered.

The capital costs of the machine would be paid for from the revenue from the water bills for the two northern towns, with Halton Hills paying two-thirds of the cost and Milton the remainder.

That arrangement was news for Halton Hills' representatives. Pointing that fact out Milton Councillor Jim Watson questioned, "Why do these things always seem so mysterious?"

Milton councillors led the questioning of the need for the machine. Councillor Marjorie Powys told regional council that Milton and Halton Hills already had equipment that could handle the work. In Milton that equipment was only used about 400 hours last year, she added.

"If it's only for Milton, we don't need it. If it's for both Milton and Halton Hills we

might consider it, if there's a need for it." Halton Hills, it was noted, also has a backhoe for use by the region for sewer and water work in the municipality, which it rents to Halton.

After a number of questions directed at public works staff members and the region's treasurer, Don Farmer, which Councillor Bill Mason termed "needless, piddling little questions," the works committee decided not to proceed with the purchase of the \$28,250 machine.

"Let's not get this machine," works committee chairman Jack Rafits angrily commented. "Why should we in the south care what they do in the north?"

Under the prodding of Milton councillors it was also brought out that an extra man would have to be hired by the region to operate the equipment.

"It's unfair for the taxpayers to have to pay for a new machine when we already have two backhoes sitting there, idle for most of the year," concluded Councillor Powys.

In New York City, on Nov. 28, 1912, Abdu'l-baha announced to the Baha'is that He had been appointed the Centre

of the Covenant by His Father, and this day is now known as the Day of the Covenant.

Abdu'l-Baha is buried on Mt. Carmel in Haifa, Israel.

## The Corporation of the Town of Halton Hills BY-LAW NO. 75 - 99

A by-law to stop up and convey to the abutting owners Saxton Street and part of Edward Street in the Town of Halton Hills, in the Regional Municipality of Halton (formerly in the Village of Limehouse and Township of Esquesing)

WHEREAS Council for this Corporation proposes to stop up and close the street known as Saxton Street in the Town of Halton Hills, (formerly in the Village of Limehouse) which said street is shown on the plan of survey prepared by Carr and Westwood of part of the West half of Lot 22, Concession 6 for the former Township of Esquesing a copy of which is annexed as Schedule "A" to this by-law;

AND WHEREAS Council for this Corporation proposes to stop up and close part of Edward Street in the Town of Halton Hills, (formerly in the Village of Limehouse) which said parcel of land is shown outlined in red on the above mentioned plan of survey, a copy of which is annexed as Schedule "A" to this by-law;

AND WHEREAS Council for this Corporation has instructed the Clerk Administrator to publish notice of Council's intention to stop up, close and survey the said Saxton Street and part of Edward Street to the abutting owners in accordance with the provisions of The Municipal Act, R.S.O. 1970, c. 284 as amended;

NOW, THEREFORE, COUNCIL FOR THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF HALTON HILLS ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. That street in the Town of Halton Hills (formerly in the Village of Limehouse) known as Saxton Street shown on the copy of the plan of survey annexed as Schedule "A" to this by-law be and the same is hereby closed and stopped up.
2. That part of Edward Street in the Town of Halton Hills, (formerly in the Village of Limehouse) lying northeasterly of the production of the northeasterly limit of Elizabeth Street, as shown on the copy of the plan of survey attached as Schedule "A" to this by-law, be and same is hereby closed and stopped up.
3. Notice of the intention of Council for this Corporation to pass this by-law is to be published once a week for four consecutive weeks in the Georgetown Herald, the Independent, the Milton Champion and in the Acton Free Press and Council for this Corporation shall hear any objections to the proposed closing and conveying of the said Saxton Street and part of Edward Street to the abutting owners at its regular meeting on the 5th day of January, 1976 or so soon thereafter as is possible, and if there are no valid objections to the proposed closings at such meeting, Council shall give this by-law a third and final reading.

BY-LAW read a first and second time, this 17th day of NOVEMBER 1975
