# Change in goal pays off

The Georgetown Geminis of the Central Ontario Junior "B" league are slowly regaining the form which saw them go undefeated in the league's first six regular season games and this revival has allowed the team to take over sole possession of fourth place in the league standings.

In the past four games, the Gems have picked up two wins and a tie while losing but once and strangely enough played their best game in the lone loss.

This past week, they tied Streetsville, 10-10, lost to first place Burlington, 2-1 and dumped Brampton 7-3. One of the main reasons for the recent resurgence can be directly attributed to a coaching change instituted by mentor, Paul Robinson.

Tuesday's 10-10 tie with Streetsville almost ended in disaster as the Geminis played two good periods of hockey then let down to allow Streetsville to come back. The "Gems" led 4-2 after the first period, 8-6 after two frames but by the 13:28 mark found themselves behind 10-9.

Doug Barnes gained the locals the single point with his third goal of the game at the 15:52 mark. Georgetown outshot Streetsville, 46-26 and possibly could have notched a win but Tomkinson had a rough night in the nets.

Overall, the Geminis, outshot Burlington, 43-34 but in the first two periods the "Gems" held a 31-20 margin. The score could easily have read, 4-0 Geminis after the first period but several missed

opportunities and the magic of Katchanoski held the local team at bay.

The game was scoreless until the 18:40 mark of the second period, when Burlington finally broke the ice. The goal was a result of a Georgetown defensive breakdown, as on a two-and-two situation, both Larry Peterson and Joe South went after the puck carrier, who calmly flipped it over to his teammate who stroled in unopposed and beat Ken Eckroth with a neat backhand.

The final Burlington goal came with little over six minutes gone in the third and it was a Georgetown missed scoring chance that set up the marker. The Geminis were applying the pressure but Charlie Knoepfl had his shot deflected high over the net after a goalmouth scramble and Burlington wheeled back for their counter.

Doug Barnes made it 2-1 at the 15:09 mark of the third and although the chances were there for a tie, once again the Burlington netminder stood his ground and frustrated the Georgetown shooters. Final score, 2-1 Burlington, but a fine display by the Geminis. Mark Lipinicky scored both Burlington markers.

Ken Eckroth played extremely well in the Georgetown nets and showed that now that he's seen action, he will be very hard to replace. Chris Milne played a very

aggressive game and added immensely to the Georgetown attack.

The Gems took a page from the Burlington book and showed that they are indeed capable of playing a controlled game and, had it not been for the amazing performance of the Burlington goalie, would almost certainly have knocked off the league's frontrunners.

Saturday night's 7-3 win over Brampton was not a severe test for the Geminis by any means but the game was again highlighted by a strong performance by Ken Eckroth in the Georgetown nets. He faced 35 shots to the Brampton goaltender's 31 but was especially impressive in the second period when Brampton staged a comeback.

The "Gems" led 1-0 after the first period, extended that lead to 4-2 after two frames, then outscored Brampton 2-1 over the final 20 minutes of play to record the win, their seventh of the year. Larry Peterson notched a hat trick for the hometown favourites. Charlie Knoepfl chipped in with a pair, while singles went to Doug Barnes and newcomer Steve Johnson.

The Geminis see action three times this week. On Friday they journey to Milton. On Saturday they play host to Burlington in what should be a barnburner, then on Sunday they travel to Brampton. Game time at the Gordon Alcott Memorial Arena on Saturday night is 7:30 p.m.

# Final frame finishes Raiders' streak at six

The winning streak ended at six games, for the Georgetown Chrysler Raiders of the OHA Intermediate "A" league as the team dropped both of their games this past week, 8-3 to Thorold on Wednesday night in Thorold, and 6-3 to Oakville at home on Friday night.

The problem that had plagued the Raiders earlier in the season cropped up again as the "Red and White" crew failed to come up with 60 minutes of solid hockey in either game and this proved their downfall. Of the 14 goals scored against them in the two games, 11 occurred in the final two frames, six in the third period alone.

This lack of finishing power must be cured if the hometown favourites are to remain atop the league standings.

The Raiders outshot Thorold, 36-32 and although down 3-1 at the end of the first period were still very much in

the game. This changed however early in the middle stanza as Thorold scored twice within 35 seconds at about the four-minute mark to leap ahead 5-1.
