# Pollution Probe tells NEC Bruce Trail threatened

protected and developed as a "linear park" if the trail's full worth as a natural and unarfected area for recreation purposes is to be realized.

Pollution Probe of Georgetown spokesman, Pam Mitchell, addressing last week's public meting of the Niagara Escarpment Com-mission held in Caledon, told the NEC that protection of the Bruce Trail against urban encroachment should be one of the commission's prime goals.

"It is only via the trail that the full variety of the escarpment topography can be truly enjoyed," Mrs. Mitchell said. "Its viability is constantly threatened as urban encroachment or private ownership considerations come to bear, more and more of the trail seems to be undergoing rerouting onto road alignments.

"It has long been mooted that easements (glying a permanent legal status similar to that of the European footpath networks), with appropriate municipal tax reduction to the affected landowners, should be initiated as soon as possible.

"Does your planning process provide for this development in the foresecable future," Mrs. Mitchell questioned.
