With Christmas coming on fast,' I have been asked what to buy for an outdoors man or woan for Christmas. In the next few weeks I will try to offer a few suggestions. Maybe you fellows can leave the Herald open to this column with some of the suggestions underlined, where it will be found.

CAMERA. Take a few photographs to show your irrends some of the highlights of your trips or for your own enjoyment. The amount of time and money has no limit when it come to taking pictures, and whether you take a thousand dollars worth of gear, around your neck like I do or just one of the tremendous little Instantics, think before you buy.

What will fit your needs?? 35 mm cameras, of course, are tops on the list as tey will carry well and are rugged. Using transparency film for alides or print film is your choice but slides are a fraction of the cost. Leica seems to have the best lenses although this will be debated. Pentax is popular, but I have been using a Practica that cost me \$125 with a standard lens and a telephoto lens of 135 mm, and have had some of these published, and use others for alide shows.

If the question of what lenses to buy comes up, ! would sugest a standard 50 or 55 mm that comes with most cameras plus a 28 mm wide angle for those shots in boats and cabins etc.

A 400mm tele can be hand held with care. I will always be glad to help anyone with the selection of a camera for themselves or as a gift. Just call 877-9290 and get in on the fun of photographing ONTARIO OUTDOORS.

Georgetown skaters win inter-club

For the third year in a row, the Georgetown Figure Skating Club has captured the area's annual Inter-Club Competition Trophy. The competition was held this past Sunday at Brampton's Century Gardens as Georgetown skaters bettered clubs from Brampton, Chinguacousy,

Streetsville and Port Credit. Georgetown finished first. compiling 37 points. Chinguacousy was second with a total of 28 points, and third place went to Brampton. Fourth spot was taken by Port Credit, with Streetsville

finishing last. In taking the championship the GFSC picked up three firsts, six seconds, four thirds, two fifths and a sixth place rating.

Out of nine entries, Sharon Stone took top spot in the National Badge Test, while Susan Cameron placed fifth. In the Girls Beginner Free Skate, Gail Shanks was second in a field of ten entries, the largest for the various categories, while Susan Kelly placed sixth.

In the Mixed Dance event, only two couples competed, and Georgetown's Terri Lamb and Ron Sparkes were the clear winners.

Eight competitors took to the ice in the Ladies Pre-Juvenile event and Leslie Pritchard proved to be the cream of the crop as she finished first. Lana Ellison had a fine routing and placed second.

Tom Simpson placed second in the Boys Beginner Free

Skate. The Juvenile Ladies Event had eight entries and Tracey Moores placed second, while Janet Shepherd was fifth. Laura Yerxa was second in a field of eight in the Ladies Pre-Novice event and Kirsten Mogg was close behind as she took third place.

There were four entries in the Boys Free Skate and Eddle Howard and Mark Snow finished second and third, respectively.

In the Girls Interpretive Event, Sherry Smeaton finished third in a field of five. The last event of the day was the Novice Ladies competition and Cathy Wild placed third.

The capacity crowd that packed the Century Gardens thoroughly appreclated the efforts of the skaters and congratulations are due the Georgetown group for their third successive champlonship.


