## GDHS swimmers second in first try

The GDHS Rebels swim team competed in their first inter-school meet this past Friday at the Acton pool and finished second, behind Nelson High School of Burlington and ahead of Acton High School.

Nelson compiled a total of 199 points, Georgetown had 144 points and Acton finished with 99 points. The Nelson team has been a power in area high school swimming circles for years and although Georgetown finished well back of the Burlington crew, the GDHS Senior team almost pulled an upset as they were narrowly edged 106-100. Nelson brought 40 swimmers to Georgetown's 23 and Acton's 17.

For Georgetown, Drew Clark picked up two firsts, in the Senior boys 50 metre Freestyle and the Senior Boys 100 metre Freestyle.

Pauline Heaton was another Georgetown swimmer who took two firsts as she won the Senior Girls 100 metre Intermediate Medley and the Senior Girls 100 metre Backstroke.

John Girvan won the Senior Boys 100 metre Butterfly, Heather Clark took top spot in the Junior Girls 50 metre Backstroke.
