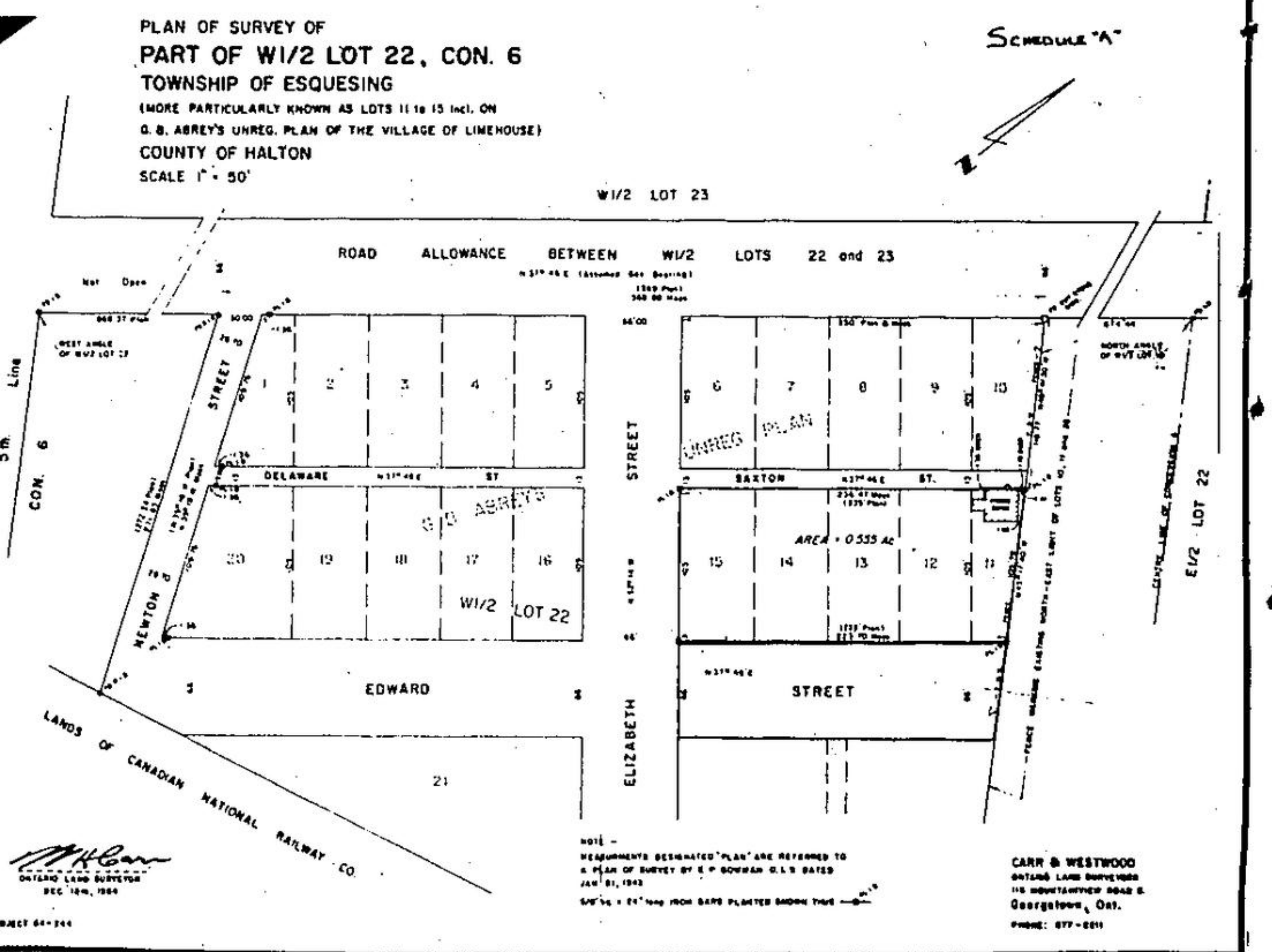

The Corporation of the Town of Halton Hills BY-LAW NO. 75 - 99

A by-law to stop up and convey to the abutting owners Saxton Street and part of Edward Street in the Town of Halton Hills, in the Regional Municipality of Halton (formerly in the Village of Limehouse and Township of Esquesing) WHEREAS Council for this Corporation proposes to stop up and close the street known as Saxton Street in the Town of Halton Hills, (formerly in the Village of Limehouse) which said street is shown on the plan of survey prepared by Carr and Westwood of part of the West half of Lot 22, Concession 6 for the former Township of Esquesing a copy of which is annexed as Schedule "A" to this by-law; AND WHEREAS Council for this Corporation proposes to stop up and close part of Edward Street in the Town of Halton Hills, (formerly in the Village of Limehouse) which said parcel of land is shown outlined in red on the above mentioned plan of survey, a copy of which is annexed as Schedule "A" to this by-law; AND WHEREAS Council for this Corporation has instructed the Clerk Administrator to publish notice of Council's intention to stop up, close and survey the said Saxton Street and part of Edward Street to the abutting owners in accordance with the provisions of The Municipal Act, R.S.O. 1970, c. 284 as amended;



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
