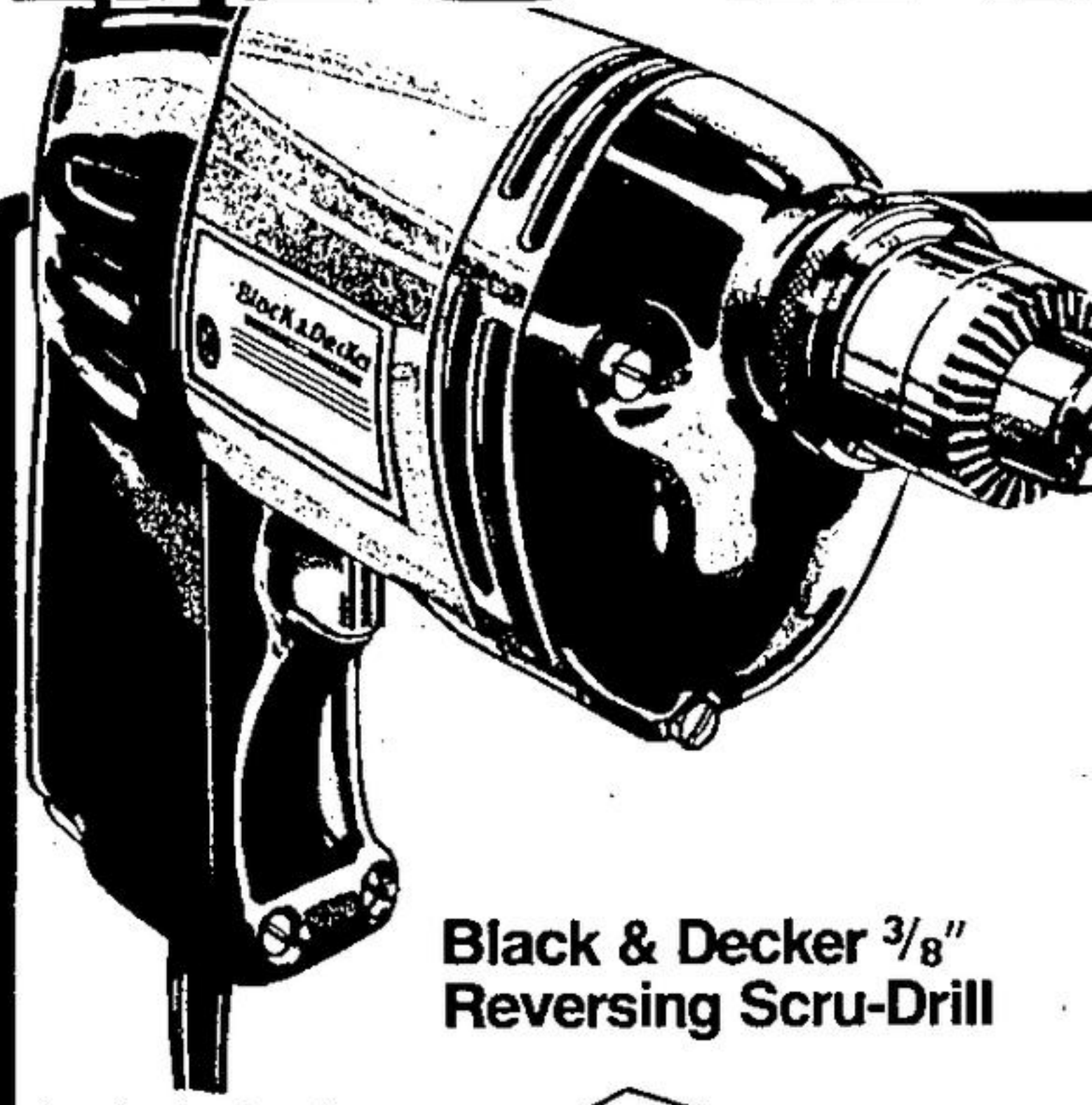

Make your appointment with Lloyd Boyd or Harry if you wish to see our Provincial Service Officer this Monday, Dec. 15 at 1 p.m.



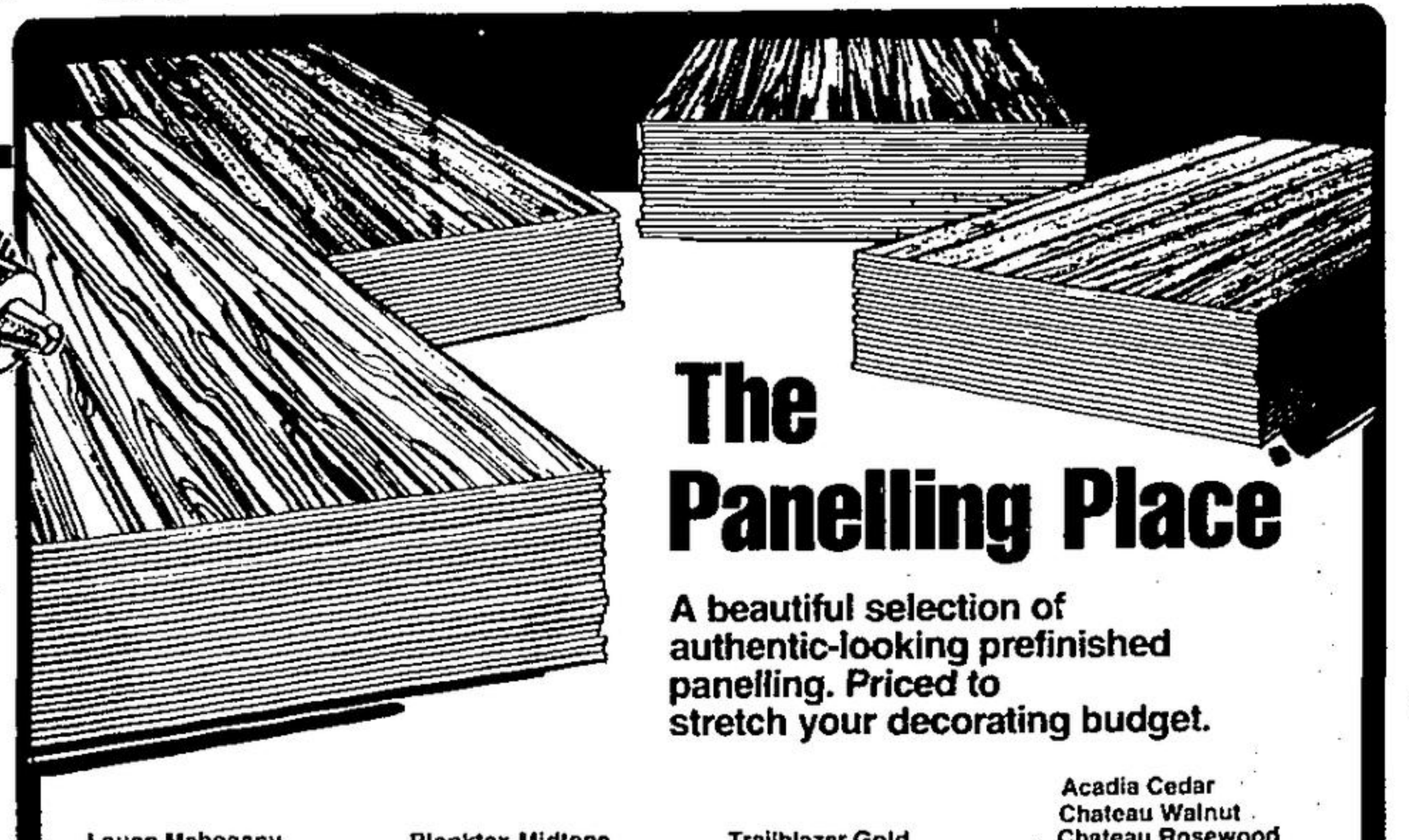

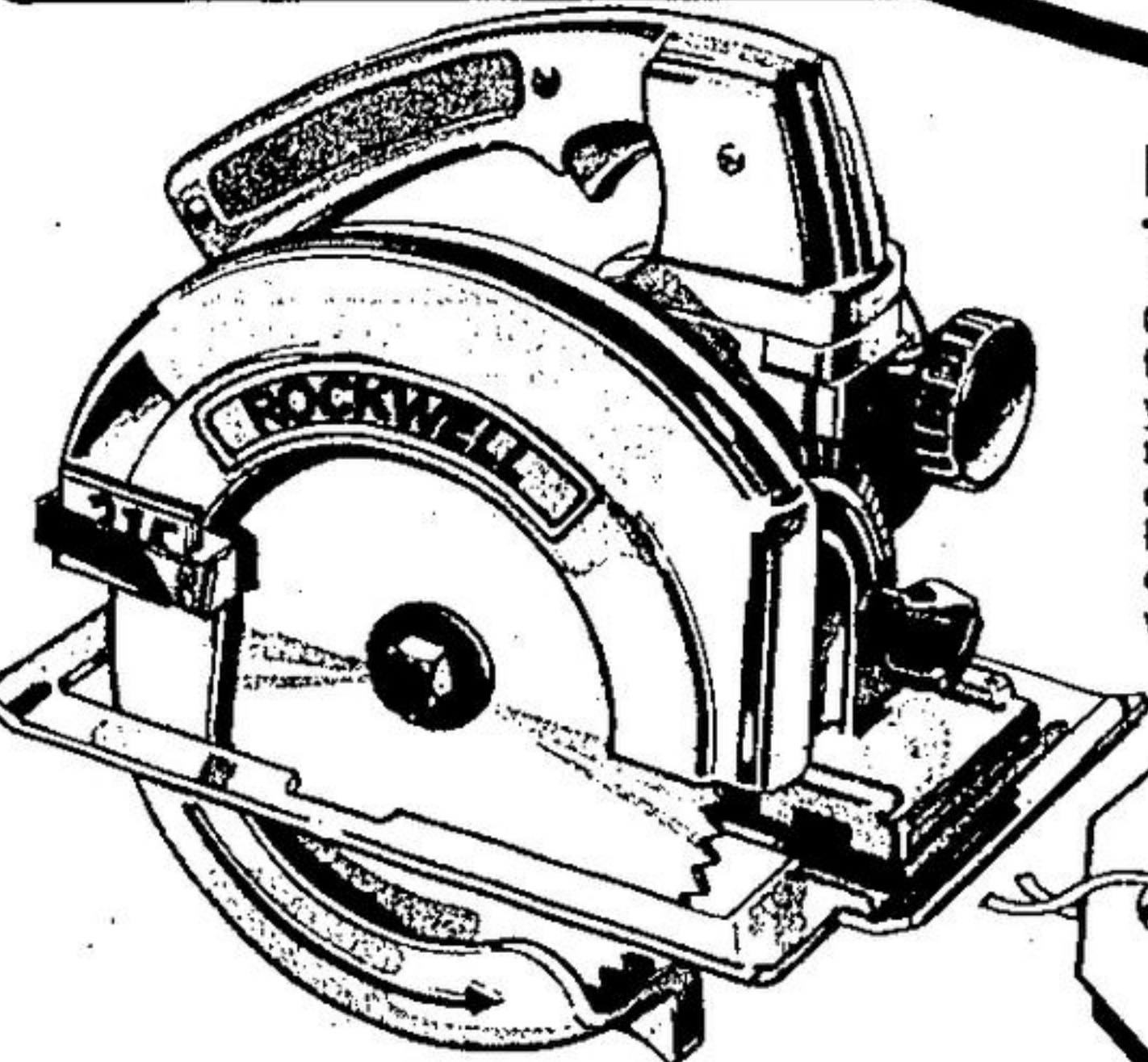
