

Bantams win Lindsay tournament

The Georgetown Major Bantams returned from the Lindsay Invitational Bantam Tournament last weekend laden with all-weather as the local crew captured the tournament's championship. It was a tough test for the local crew but, showing a good ability to work as a complete team, plus pulling off some great passes, the Gage Stationery squad won three straight games to earn the top honors. Their first match of the day-long tournament pitted Georgetown against Bradford.

The Gage Gang easily set their winning pace with a 4-1 victory. Bill Taylor was the top marksman notching two of Georgetown's four goals. Ed Dwyer and Mark Brabant added singles with assists going to Mark Eutenier, Mike McMenemy (3), Greg Thompson and Dave Kemshead.

The win moved Georgetown into the semifinals where they ran up against the tough hometown favorites. However teamwork and hustle paid off as the Gage Bantams posted perhaps the upset of the tournament, a 4-2 victory over Lindsay.

The Lindsay Bantams had been heavily favored to be the champions of their own tourney but, led by Mark Eutenier and Mike McMenemy, the entire Georgetown team played good, solid hockey to earn the win. The host team was particularly frustrated by the superb goaltending of Bill Humphreys in the Georgetown net.

Mark Brabant hit for the first Georgetown goal taking a pass from Greg Thompson. Mike McMenemy added the second on a pass from Bill Taylor then Mark Eutenier hit for what proved to be the winner on a play set up beautifully by Greg Thompson.

Bill Taylor notched a hat-trick to which Ed Dwyer and Greg Thompson added singles. McMenemy assisted on three plays, Dwyer on two and Kemshead on one.

Minor Midgets add two wins to record

Four was the lucky number for the Georgetown Minor Midgets as they racked up two more wins on the weekend, first dumping Chinguacousy 4-3 on Thursday and then easily edging Streetsville 4-1 on Saturday.

A 100 percent team effort produced the Georgetown victory over Ching. Blake Emmerson had a standout game, notching one goal and three assists. Steve Krajachick slapped home a goal and set up another as did Alex Verag. Curt Brownlee rounded out Georgetown's scoring.

Three of Georgetown's goals were, in fact, shorthanded efforts as the game was marked with an uncommon number of penalties. Georgetown had more than 100 minutes in penalties.

Tim Turner, Blake Emmerson, Steve Krajachick, Dave Townsend, Terry Simpson and Chris Murden were standouts through the game. Turner led with two goals followed by Blake Emmerson with one goal and an assist, and Krajachick with one goal.

Gift ideas for the sportsman

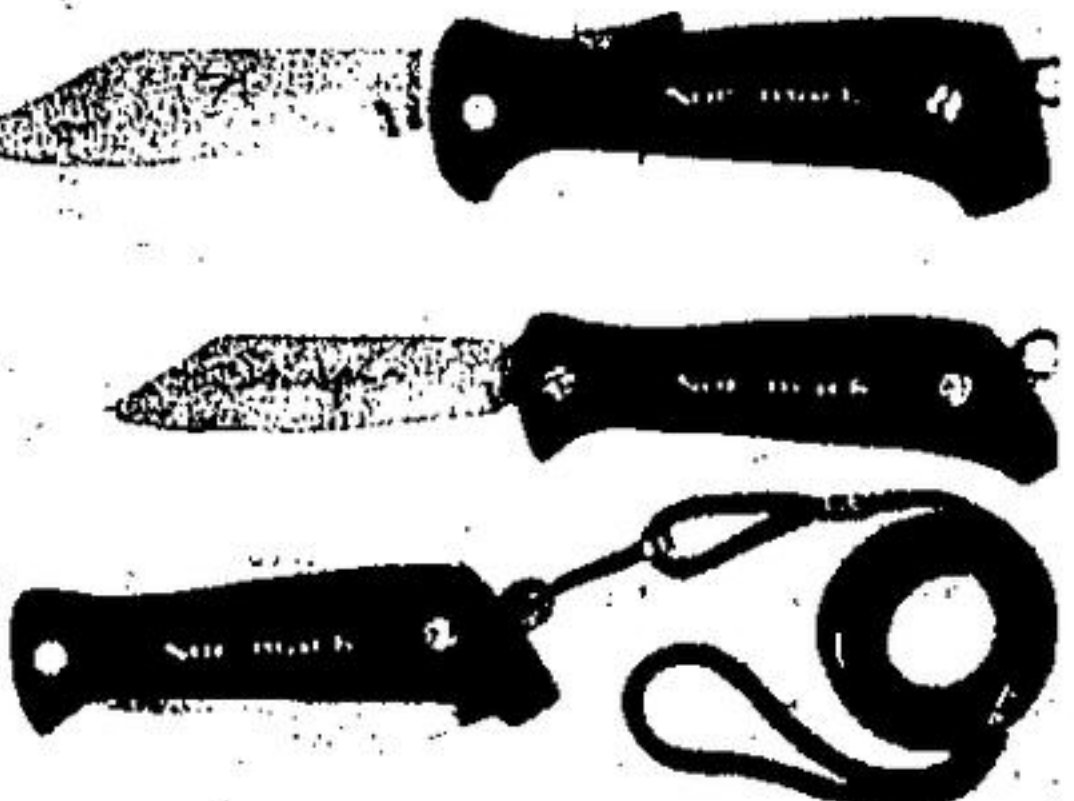

The weather was so mild last Saturday that many people took advantage of it and got in some fishing. Most of the popular spots on the Lake Huron shoreline and the bays of Georgian Bay were giving up some good catches, depending on where you were when they started biting. The Rainbow Trout at this time of year, do not feed continually as they did earlier, but on more of a schedule. It seems they follow the pattern of all wild creatures in their movements. The solar tables will be of great help at this time of the year. The season on Lake Trout opens on Lake Simcoe on December 20 and remains open until October 5 next year.

More Lakers are taken through the ice on Simcoe than the rest of the year. Hence the special season, and you will only be allowed two compared to three in other areas.

Gift ideas for Christmas. Now with the mails moving again, a gift for the fisherman that is sure to please is the Ontario Fishing Guide. This is a comprehensive book on sport fishing in Ontario, as the name implies, and a guide to it as well. Using this book you will be able to dispense with guide services on a lake you have never fished before. Don't get me wrong, a guide is a valuable addition to any trip, but not everyone can afford one.

Trotting patterns are shown along with what species of fish are in any specific area of the waters you are fishing in. I reviewed this book in Ontario Outdoors some months ago and know it to be a definite addition to a fisherman's bookshelf. A gift for every outdoorsman is the Normark presentation folding knife, commonly called the Big and

The fruit of the sportsman's efforts can truly be made into festive dishes, and can grace any table. This one from Pam Dunlop in Toronto:

Wild Rice, soak in water over night. Saute chopped onion, chopped celery, chopped green pepper in butter.

Saute sliced mushrooms in butter till half cooked. Boil the rice in fresh water till grains open, drain and add rice to vegetables.

Boil pheasants in salted water (enough to cover) till tender. Remove the skin, take meat from bones in bite-size pieces.

Add them to rice mixture along with beef consommé to moisten.

Bake in 350 degree oven, covered for about one hour. The best way of telling if it is done is ask me to taste test it for you, (that's a veiled invitation to dinner).

Sour Dough can be a great addition to any baked goods and this is a good time to start. If you do not have a "starter" then now is the time to get it going in order for it to "age" a little, as this will improve the flavour of any of the sour dough starters.

STARTER: 3 cups all purpose flour, 1 package active dry yeast, 2 1/2 cups warm water.

Dissolve yeast in water, add to flour, then blend. When creamy smooth, set aside to rise. Then place this mix in a glass preserving jar or a crock. Covered and refrigerated this mix will keep for several weeks. You may wish to use half of the mix you make for pancakes or rolls.

When ready to make up a recipe just add flour and water to the "starter" and set to rise.

Next week, some recipes for Christmas baking. Any outdoorsman worth his salt will be able to bake and cook. So why not take over from your wife this year? I think in that way she will appreciate, a little more, our ONTARIO OUTDOORS.

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Work experience for that first job

Ontario CAREER

Action Program

Available to unemployed persons, aged 16 to 24, under the Ontario Career Action Program.

More than half of the unemployed in the Province are young people. Because of this, the Ontario Government has created a work-experience program, with a living allowance, that is designed to help young job seekers find gainful employment.

To be eligible, you must be at least 16 years old, but less than 25 years of age, and you must be unemployed, but actively seeking employment. You must not now be receiving full-time formal education.

Assistance includes on-the-job training plus an allowance of \$100 per week up to a maximum of 52 weeks. The aim is to provide the guidance and experience necessary for employment in private business or industry. The Ontario

Government and Canada Manpower will assist trainees in their search for employment. To apply, fill out an application form at your local Canada Manpower Centre. Final selection of applicants and allocation of training assignments will be made by the Government of Ontario. The first program begins January, 1976. Apply soon. Further information about the program is available at your Canada Manpower Centre. The Ontario Career Action Program is administered by the Ontario Ministry of Colleges and Universities in cooperation with the Ontario Youth Secretariat.
