

With the current contract between the Halton Board of Education and its approximately 9,500 secondary and public school teachers drawing to a close in 1976, both sides of the negotiating committee are preparing already for a tough period of bargaining\_

The first round in the bargaining went to the board Thursday night as they voted not to grant research officers for either the Halton Elementary Teachers Pederation or the Ontario Secondary School Teachers Federation leaves of absence during the negotiating period.
