Limit on Walleye reduced

I know that many of you head south for the Christmas season. I also know that there is good fishing almost anywhere you go, even in the Long Island, New York area. At this time of the year there, the Cod fishing is at its best, although it is also at its coldest. The largest fish are caught around now.

The further south you go and the warmer the water and the air, then the fish species differ of course, but the fishing can still be very good. Why not keep me informed and pass on to our readers, just how good it really is? When you return give me a call and let me know what species and how big. This may be Ontario Outdoors, but we still recognize the fact that as Ontarians, we fish elsewhere as well.

In the exact opposite direction, I received the Christmas card-letter from Ernie and Paulette Leuenberger in Nakina, Ontario. For those of you who do not know, Leuenberger Air Service Ltd. flies fishermen and hunters out of the town of Nakina to some of the best fishing to be had in the province that is available to almost every fisherman. The cost is reasonable and the time to get there is also not too bad.

Ernie services some 17 lakes and wilderness canoe trips as well as many temporary camps. Kind of, "you name the place and we will get you there" kind of fishing. They maintain four planes and intend to add two more next year and are working with the Outboard to provide more of an experience for the outdoorsman.

This could be the best Christmas gift of all, a trip to our northland, a gift truly worth waiting for.

The Lake Trout season has been announced for Lake Temagami. It will be Feb. 15, 1976 to March 15, 1976 then will close till May 15 1976 and will run till Sept. 30, 1976. The season in other waters in Temagami district will be Jan. 1, 1976 until Sept. 30, 1976.

Walleye season in Lake Nipissing will be the same as this year, May 24, 1976 running through March 1, 1977. In other words the current season will close on March 15, 1976 and re-open on May 24, 1976.

The difference is, the limit has been reduced to four fish from the current six. It is hoped that this will bring the Walleye population in Lake Nipissing back to its former level of productivity.
