Swedish Twist?

Today is Christmas Eve. Probably too late to get that last minute gift. Better sweeten her up with a little help in the kitchen.

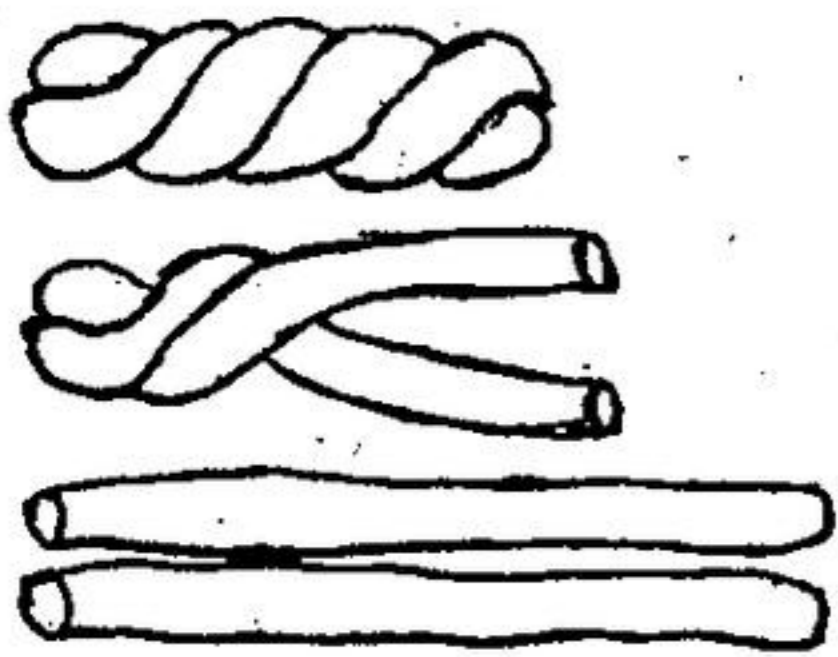
Baking for the festive season can be done today and kept over till tomorrow, Christmas day. The following recipe will grace any table and is very simple to make.

SWEDISH TWIST

Using a regular bread recipe to start this can be done and baked today. If you use the Sour Dough recipe it can be started today and completed in time for dinner tomorrow. To your regular one cup of sour dough starter, add two cups flour, and enough warm water to make smooth batter. Let rise (over night is best although a few hours will do).

Place one cup of the dough back in a mason jar as your perpetual starter. You should have two cups of starter which you add two tablespoons of shortening. Mix dry ingredients separately; 1 heaping tablespoon of milk powder, 1 cup flour, 1 teaspoon baking soda, 1 tablespoon sugar. Add dry ingredients to dough and mix. Place on floured board, and knead about 100 times. Place in warm spot 45 minutes to rise, punch down the dough and divide equally.

Form into two cylinders about 18 inches long as per diagram. Pinch two ends together and overlay to form a twist effect, and pinch the last two ends. Set this again to rise till double (45 minutes).



For the topping, take 1 egg yolk, 1 teaspoon of milk and mix lightly. 1/2 cup blanched almonds coarsely chopped, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon, candied cherries-halved.

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. With a pastry brush, coat the twist with egg and milk mixtures, then mix the almonds, sugar and cinnamon and sprinkle on top. Set cherries in two rows or in a pattern on top.

Bake for about 25 minutes or until golden brown. Believe me it will be great. I finished mine only minutes before starting this column and the results are gratifying.

The one thing that stands out with sour dough recipes is that the ingredients do not have to be exact.

Thank you for your kindness at this special season and from myself and family, may this be a Christ-filled Christmas and a time of great joy. When giving, remember to give your interest and concern to ONTARIO OUTDOORS.
