



**TISSUE DOGS**

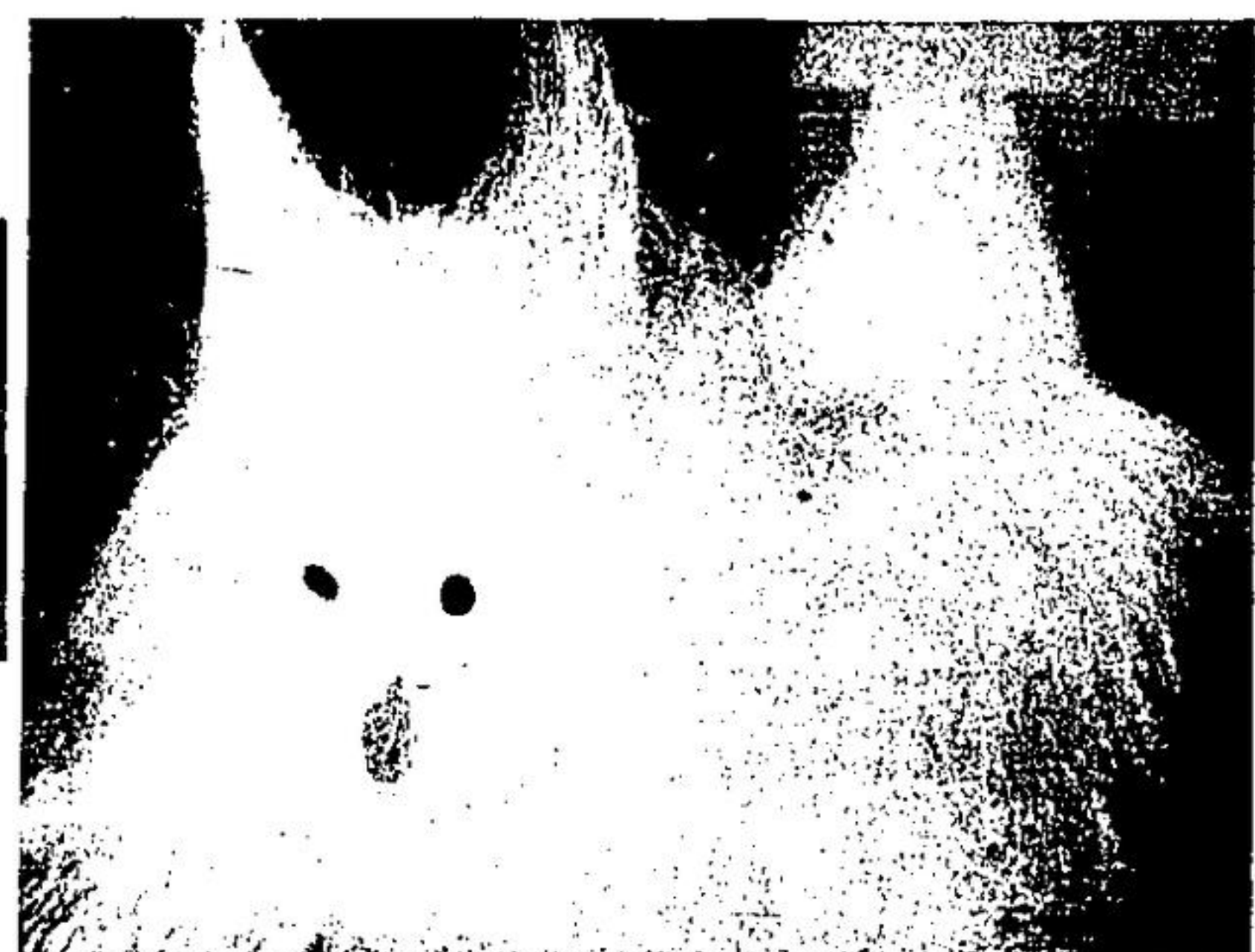
Materials needed; piece of long-haired fun fur, 15 inches by 12 inches; pair of moveable eyes; piece of red felt; box of tissues.

Fold the fun fur lengthwise with the sides together. Cut a slit in the middle of the material approximately four inches long.

Sew with a sewing machine each side of the material

together. Turn right side out. Place over a box of tissues. Brush fabric to the shape of a dog, one end for the tail and the other for head and the ears. Sew on the moveable eyes, glue on the felt which has been cut into the shape of a tongue.

Cost for the tissue dog is around \$1.75 a piece.



**It's proof of punch**

As an easy way to serve a big crowd, punch is very popular with many Americans, many of whom appreciate the absence of a sweetish, wishy-washy portion in favor of a punch with some "punch" in it.

Punch was introduced to England from India. The name may have come from the Hindi word for five, "panch," because traditionally punch was supposed to be made with five ingredients.

Punch was a great favorite in Colonial America and there are stories of punch bowls large enough to have "swimmed" half a dozen young geese. The record is held by a 17th century English naval officer who served to 6,000 guests a punch which had among its ingredients 80 casks of brandy, 20,000 large limes and 1,300 pounds of sugar!

Don't make the mistake

of using inexpensive spirits just because of the quantity needed for punch. On the contrary, you need a good quality and strong proof liquor to hold up against all the mixings and melting ice. The only 90-proof Scotch in the country is called Famous Grouse and it's a top grade, smooth Scotch which has been popular in Scotland for 174 years.

Of course, you can have two punch bowls, one for folks who like their drinks low key, but here are some newer punch recipes for people who don't care for the wine-y, multi-fruit concoctions.

**SCOTCH HIGHLAND PUNCH**

In a punch bowl with a large piece of ice put 1 part Scotch (2 fifths of Famous Grouse to serve 12), 1 part orange juice,

1/4 part Sloe Gin, 1 tablespoon mint syrup or to



taste (get mint syrup in gourmet store). Stir well and let ice melt a bit before serving. If you must, add some orange slices.

**SCOTCH TEA PUNCH**

In a very big jug put: 2 fifths of 90-proof Scotch, 1 pint good brandy, 1 cup green tea, rind of six lemons, 1 teaspoon cloves, 1 tablespoon allspice, 30 teaspoons sugar. Mix well, seal the jug and let stand 6 weeks before serving. Serve in punch bowl with big piece of ice, dilute a little before pouring. This is a delicious, spicy drink; good hot too.

**Fondue Hollandaise**

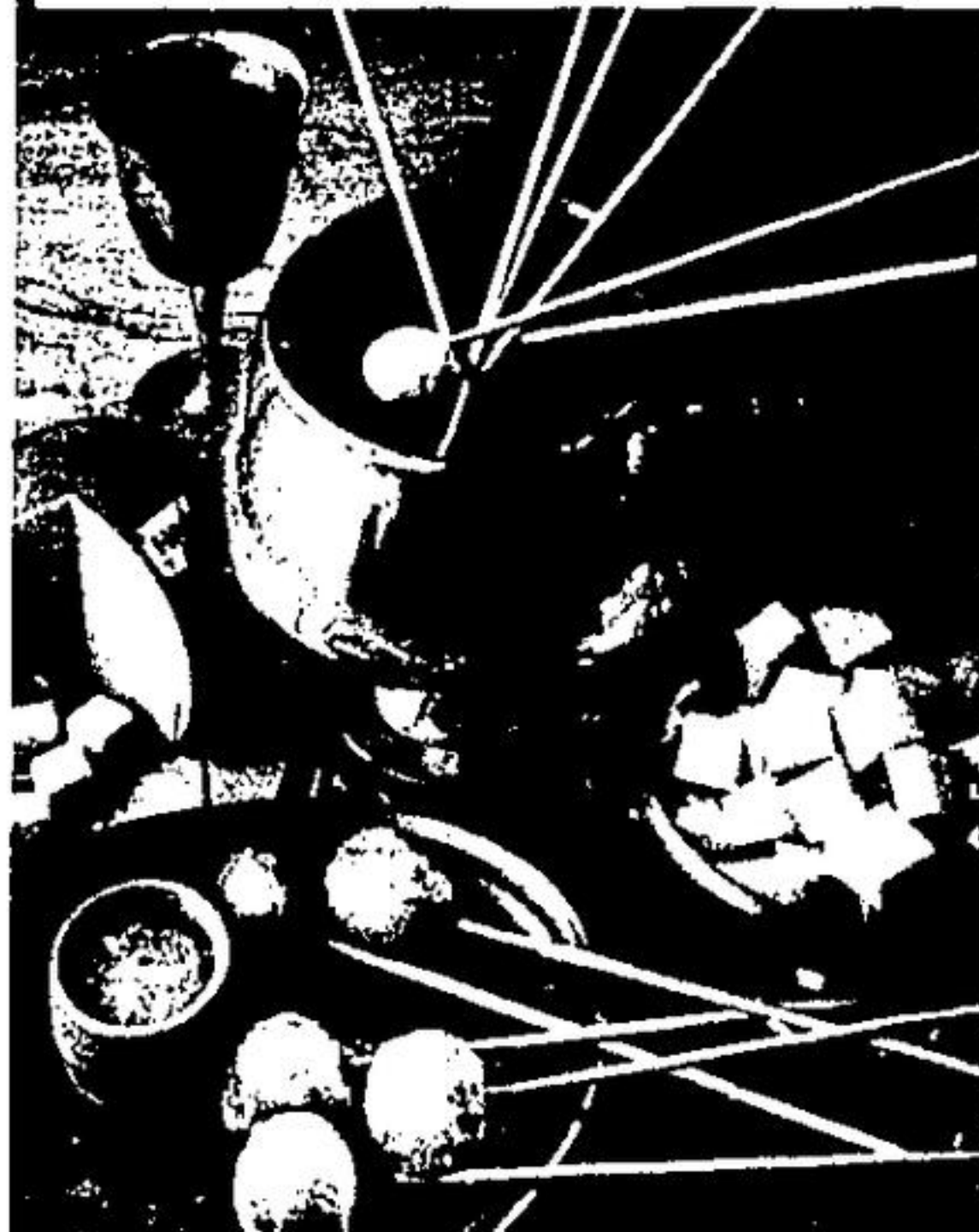
A delightfully different way to fondue, crunchy beer batter hides soft cheese filling of imported Holland cheese.

- Imported Holland Gouda or Edam cheese cut in bite-size cubes
- 2 cups cooking oil
- 1 cup sifted all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup beer
- dash of nutmeg

Four cooking oil into fondue pot to a depth of approximately 2 inches. Pre-heat oil to 375°F. on stove burner. Place fondue pot over alcohol burner at the table. Mix dry ingredients together; add eggs and beer; beat at high speed until batter is creamy smooth. Place

batter on the table in an attractive sauce pot or bowl. Shake imported Holland Edam or Gouda cheese cubes in bag with 1/2 cup of flour. Give each guest a fondue fork. Spear a cube of cheese, submerge in batter, then hold in hot oil until batter puffs, crisps and browns. Holland cheese centre will be soft and delicious, but not stringy, after about 60 seconds. Provide a selection of prepared sauces in which guests dip their cheese puffs. Chutney, plum sauce and cocktail sauce are suggested!

Note: Allow five to six ounces of cheese per person.

**SPARK WITH SPRIGS**

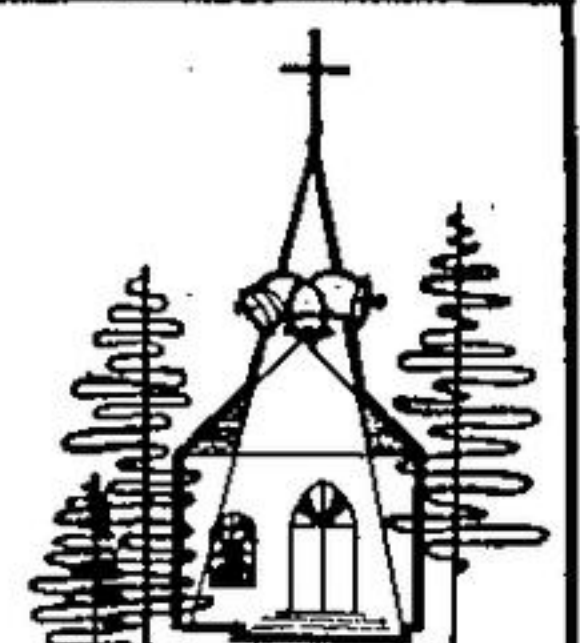
