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

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## REPORT ON THE ALIGNMENT OF THE HYDRO TRANSMISSION ROUTE BETWEEN POINT 33 NEAR COLBECK AND POINT 95 NEAR LIMEHOUSE

The Province of Ontario, by Order-in-Council No. O.C. 1585-75 dated the tenth day of June, 1975, authorized and directed the Environmental Hearing Board to review information pertaining to that portion of the approved Hydro transmission route, Bradley Junction to Georgetown, between point 33 near Colbeck and point 95 near Limehouse, as identified in the Ontario Hydro Bradley-Georgetown Environmental Report, and conduct the public meetings necessary to determine if the selected alignment between those points could be modified in any way that, having regard for reasonable cost, would minimize the impact on the agricultural land and undesirable effects upon the environment and report its findings to the Minister of Energy. The Environmental Hearing Board having reviewed the information and conducted public meetings has submitted its report to the Minister of Energy. All comments on the report of the Environmental Hearing Board should be received by the Minister of Energy by January 31, 1976.

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
