In the third game of the day the Royal Pizza Kings edged closer to the basement of the league as they fell at the hands of the present last-placed crew, Guelph-Clair Sinoco by a 7-3 tally.

That win by the Sinoco crew was pretty well the result of a good second period which produced three unanswered goals for the victors that put them on top to stay.

Dave Irons was definitely the top sharpshooter for the Guelph-Clair crew rapping home four goals while assisting on another. The top point total honors however went to Steve McLellan who notched two goals and assisted on four others.

John McKeen earned one goal and three assists for Guelph-Clair while Paul Brisley and Keith Bennett rounded out the point totals with a single assist.

This is your chance to stop the region from putting their dumps on the banks of rivers as they have been doing. Much damage has been done to the Credit River by the use of the Georgetown dump and they even put the second big dump on the river just over the railway tracks.
