While the number of competing schools had dropped alightly from over 20 to 17-due largely to the Metro high school strike that hindered a number of Toronto schools in training teams-the teams that were entered came with one of the best representations in the tournament's history.

Teams came from as far away as North Bay, Ottawa, Smith Falls and Windsor for the tournament that has now gained enough recognition as to rank closely behind the All-Ontarios in significance.

Despite the competition the host GDHS wreatling team maintained its firm grasp on the tournament's silverware, for another year. Georgetown accululated a total of 94 points, well above the second ranked team from Fergus which earned 53 points.

Third was Smith Falls, coached by ex-Georgetown wrestling coach Lew Martin. Central Peel from Brampton and Assumption from Windsor were tied for fourth with 28


