### Ontario Outdoors Hints for winter pictures

Member, Outdoor Writers of Canada O.K. so you got a camera for Unristmas. Now what? Well some hints on how to get the best use from that marvelous machine are always good.

Number one, don't expect to get fantastic photographs in sub-zero weather. A camera is like everything else, it gets cold and doesn't work quite well. You can have your camera winterized, but then all the oils and light greases that are taken out of the camera for this must be put back in for the warmer weather, unless you don't mind the camera wearing out extra fast.

The best alternative for cold weather pictures, is to have two cameros, and not everyone can afford this.

This slowing down as a result of the cold can be overcome by keeping the camera in your jacket and taking it out only for a shot and then only briefly.

Another method, although not as sure for the amateur, is to use a faster than called for setting in the speed. This should give the right speed when it is slowed down with the cold, but not the same every time and I would not recommend this system.

The rest of the year is something else, again. No problem with speed of the shutter. If it is automatic, hen shoot away. If not, be sure of your setting and keep in aind that light is reflected and absorbs the inherent colour rom the nearest object. For example, if you stand your st sject next to a red barn, then you wind up with a red face a. well as your subject having a red face from the colour of the barn being transferred to the skin tones.

Framing is an important and often overlooked aspect of photography and is the downfall of even some professionals. I know, I have seen many instances of this, and have put this as foremost in all the photographs I have

taken professionaly over the past eight years.

Don't be alraid of admitting you don't know everything about taking pictures and get yourself a good book on the subject. It will be worth its weight in pictures

RABBIT hunting is on the upswing this year as their numbers are increasing. You can now see jackrabbits in the Georgetown area where they have not been seen for some years. There have been a few around, but not in such numbers. Cottontails are abundant and in the Northern parts of the district (Orangeville, Hillsburg) you can can sometimes see three kinds of rabbit stew on the hoof as it were. The three are the common cottontall, (the eastern) the Snowshoe or Varying Hare, and the European Hare commonly called the jackrabbit.

I was out on Saturday with Dave Hobbs of Norval, and the snow was well up past my knees and I am six foot two. Snowshoes are a must, or, at the least, skis. Thirty six inches of snow makes for hard walking and that is in the Limehouse area.

Apparently Orangeville does not have as much snow as we do, I don't know, I have not been up there for a while. Ice flahing is well under way on Lake Simcoe and it looks as if it may be a good year, catch-wise. Anyone who has been up or is planning to go up, please call me. I would like first hand word as to conditions and cannot get away myself. I am expecting word from some of the operators, but do not have it at the time of writing.






