How to choose snowshoes

As mentioned last week, rabbit hunting is still good and will be open until Feb. 28. This includes the Cottontail, the Hare, and the Snowshoe.

A little dissertation on the use and purchase of snowshoes for wearing in the snow may be in order. If you want to get into it without the expected expense, then get out to the "Come Along" the Credit Valley Conservation Authority is conducting at the Terra Cotta Conservation Area, on Sundays. There is an instructor on hand, plus an opportunity to borrow snowshoes.

If you are at the point where you want to buy your own, then decide what type of snow you expect to be in, and decide from there. The four styles shown in the sketch which accompanies this week's column, are sometimes modified. This goes especially for the Bear Paw design, which is sometimes modified almost to the style of the Maine.

The Maine or Algonquin is the most useful style, as the tails tend to keep the front up out of the snow by weight displacement.

If you expect to encounter deep snow then the Alaskas or Trail is the best choice. This winter of course is the exception rather than the rule, as we do not expect this depth of snow every year, but the cottage areas most often do.

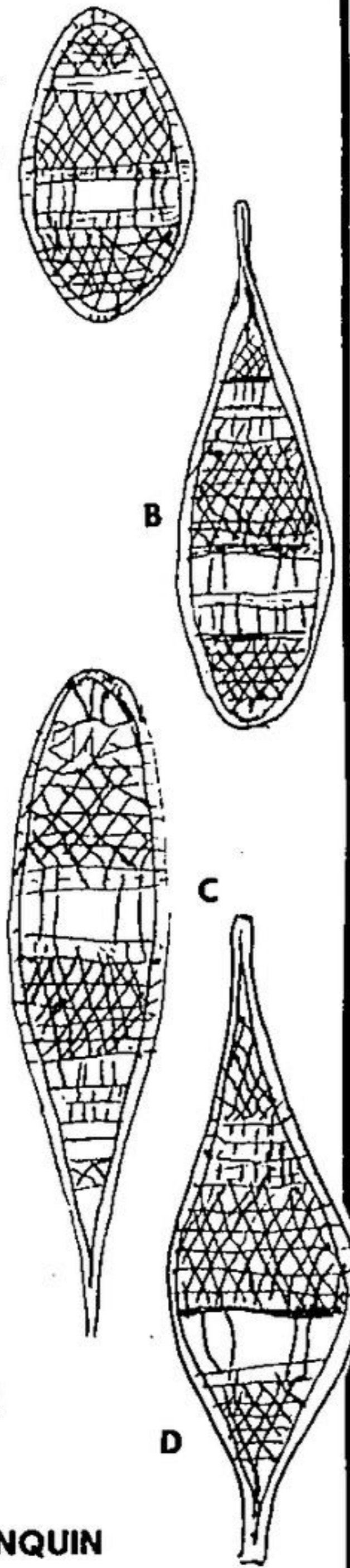
The Ojibwa is not always a good shoe for the average person, but they are made cheaper due to the ends being tied rather than formed back on themselves. The pair I presently use are the Algonquin style and they are usually adequate for my needs.

Back to rabbits, don't forget to field dress them as soon as you can, preferably right away. This preserves the taste of the meat. Don't just throw them in your game pocket, or a bag. The meat should be cooled, either by placing snow in the cavity or letting the air inside. If you are afraid of infection, then buy a cheap pair of rubber gloves from the drug store.

Cooking kills any bacteria, so there is no fear from that end. It is not necessary to skin the rabbit, this will keep it clean, and can be done when you get home and preparing it for cooking or freezing. Cooking is simple or it can be an experience for the expert chef.

Here are a couple of ways to prepare your day's bag. Rinse in several changes of salted water, mix 1 cup bread crumbs with 1/2 cup chopped mushrooms, 1/4 tsp salt, 1/2 tsp paprika, juice and grate rind of 1 lemon. Drain meat, rub with lemon juice or vinegar, stuff, truss, and oil.

Place in roasting pan, pour 1 cup of milk or cream over and cook in hot oven (385) for approx. 1 hour.
Or try rabbit meat deep fried in batter. Done this way it should be par boiled first. I will give you a recipe for Hasenbraten in next week's ONTARIO OUTDOORS.
