# Peterson didn't win but Julian is happy with his new leader

"We've got a formidable, new broom capable of sweeping out Premier Davis," MPP Julian Reed commented to the Herald this week, "and it has given us a whole new lease on life."

MPP Reed said that Dr. Stuart Smith of Hamilton newly elected leader of the Ontario Liberal Party, would receive "enthusiastic" and "determined" support from the Liberal caucus.

The campaign, which saw Dr. Smith win on the third ballot by a 45-vote margin over London businessman David Peterson, was "cleanly fought", Reed said.

During the campaign for leadership of Ontario Liberals, MPP Reed was a supporter of Peterson.

"Naturally you feel disappointment for your own candidate to lose. But people have to accept there have to be losers in order to have winners. We'll iron it all out and work it through. We're all Liberals."

MPP Reed said an outcome of the "cleanly fought" campaign was the absence of any "bad-feelings."

"If there was healing to be done, it was done right at the convention. I'm very proud of Peterson. The democratic process has performed well."

Halton's rookie MPP was not about to make a definite statement on the likelihood of a spring election but he did say "We're as ready as we can be for an election."

He said that for the sake of this newly-elected party leader he hoped for as much time as possible. "But we're ready to go."

Caucus Liberals have "shown up well" in Ontario's minority government, MPP Reed said. As the third party in the government, "Liberals have made a large contribution."

He said that "old-timers" in the caucus had taken rookie members to their heart and "helped us. The feeling's good, the best it's been in years."

Earlier at the convention, some of MPP Reed's activities made national television. If

you just begin to mention it, he begins to laugh, then explains that he was flattered when the party organization asked him to make a tribute to departing Robert Nixon, former Liberal party leader.

"I had the rush of a song and then composed it." At the convention where he sang the song, Reed said, "It was great fun."

Attendance by area Liberals at the leadership convention in Toronto last weekend which saw the election of Dr. Stuart Smith of Hamilton to the party's top job, was "exemplary", said Frank Allen, president of the Halton-Burlington Liberal Association yesterday.

He said that support by the area Liberals was "evenly split between Smith, Peterson, and Roy."

Peterson lost out to Smith by 45 votes on the third ballot and Roy was third runner-up.

In addition to MPP Julian Reed and himself, Allen said Grant Casely, Alice Walker, Nancy Dunlop, George Henderson, all of Georgetown, Laurie Reed (MPP Reed's brother), Bob Bonnette, Edith Hillman of Acton, and Isabel Hammer of Burlington, attended the convention.

Alternate delegates to the convention were Carol Lawson, Jeanne Servos, Dolly Molden, George Burt, all of Georgetown and Bill Coates of Acton and Al Harmer of Burlington.

Observers at the convention from the provincial Liberals were Mr. and Mrs. Jack Lawson and Mary Ann Casely of Georgetown; Aldo Braley, John Mowat, Gloria Coates and Eleanor Nickelson of Acton; and Mr. and Mrs. Jim Cunningham of Hornby.

Federal observers to the convention from the Halton area were Peter Walker and Mrs. Laurie Harris, both of Georgetown, and Miss Elizabeth Robson of Ashgrove.

It was also at the convention, Reed told the Herald, that he came to know Nixon better. He said, that Nixon was "probably the best caucus operator in the Liberal Party."
