35 parking spaces disappear

Downtown merchants in Acton are up in arms over the lack of parking space and at Monday evening's work's committee meeting, a delegation of two from the Acton Chamber of Commerce made known their feelings on the subject.

Paul Nielsen and Louis Charlebois of the Chamber of Commerce told the work's committee that in the last year 32 parking spaces have disappeared but that the downtown merchants need a

minimum of 50 spaces. Nielsen told the committee the consensus of downtown merchants was that "We cannot afford to lose any more parking."

He said that regardless of how reconstruction of Mill Street takes place, "we need off-street parking." He mentioned that parking on Willow St., John St. and St. Alban's St. had been lost.

Off-street parking would not solve the problem, Nielsen said but "would make it more palatable."

Councillor Ern Hyde pointed out that money to reconstruct Acton's Mill Street may only be available this year and if it is, it should be put to use. He told Nielsen and Charlebois, "Pressure will be on you to provide parking but there is no way we should lose what may be here this year and never again."

Town engineer Robert Austin asked the two delegates if they could have some feeling of the merchants to present to the committee in two weeks because as far as engineering goes, "we don't have that much time."

Chairman Mike Armstrong wished the two delegates well and suggested to them to get the item on the planning board agenda as it was out of the jurisdiction of the works committee.
