The Neilds, who came to Georgetown five years ago from Don Mills, deal in used

paperbacks and magazines. Customers in the book-lined shop can either buy or trade paperbacks.

To build up their stock, the Neilds purchase your unwanted paperbacks at 10 percent of the cover price.

Neilds told the Herald he and his wife were looking for a

small business to operate and after meeting a man who had a used paperback store in Aurora, they decided to take the plunge.

The nearest store dealing in used paperbacks is in Brampton, Neild said. "Georgetown needs something like this. It's a service. We're helping to recycle books."

Fair board contributes \$2,500 towards bleachers

At last Thursday's annual meeting the Georgetown Fall Fair Board decided to contribute \$2,500 towards the bleachers which Halton Hills Recreation Department will purchase for the Georgetown Fairgrounds.

The bleachers, totalling approximately \$20,000, will be purchased from the Toronto

International Dragway for use in the park. The fair board was approached by the recreation department to consider paying a portion of the total cost.

The Board is eligible to apply for a government grant under capital expenditures which will cover 25 percent of the cost, leaving the board to

pay a total of \$2,000.

Charles Fogal told the annual meeting that the fall fair board will be able to move the portable bleachers to whatever location is desired by the board during fall fair time.

A unanimous vote at the meeting accepted the motion to pay \$2,500 towards the cost of the bleachers.

Mrs. Goodwin voiced sincere appreciation to Mrs. Chamberlain for her gracious hospitality.



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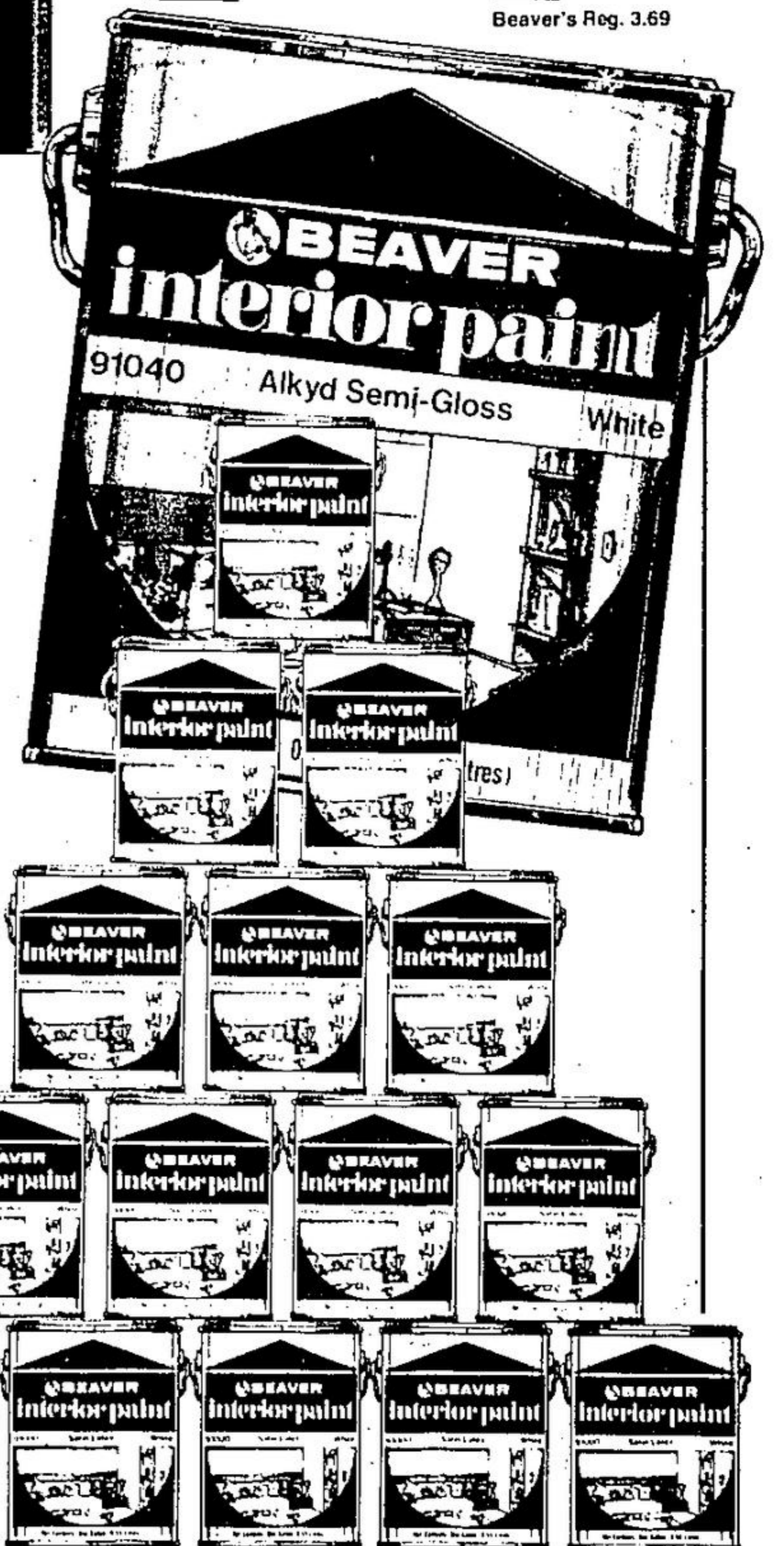
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
