## Fair board contributes \$2,500 towards bleachers

The Board is eligible to apply for a government grant which will cover 25 percent of the cost, leaving the board to pay a total of \$2,000. Charles Fogal told the annual meeting that the fall fair board will be able to move the portable bleachers to whatever location is desired by
