

Friends gather to wish master printer well

"The Herald has certainly been a part of my life. Other than my home life I have spent the other half of my life with the newspaper," stated Garfield "Mac" McGillvray, master printer for the Georgetown Herald for the past 49 years, at a retirement party held in his honour last Friday evening.

Among the 75 people who were present to honour Mac were his four children; Mr. and Mrs. Ross McGillvray, Mr. and Mrs. Doug McGillvray, daughter Carol, (Mrs. R. Richmond) and daughter Gail. Seated at the head table were daughter Gail, Em and

Garfield McGillvray, William Evdokimoff, publisher of the Herald and Mrs. and Mrs. Darrell Johnson. Mr. Johnson is the production supervisor for Thompson Newspaper. Other special guest for the evening included Walter Blehn, a former publisher of the Herald for many years and

Mrs. Alleen Douglas, daughter of the late J. M. Moore, second publisher of the Georgetown Herald. On behalf of the Georgetown Fall Fair Board of which Garfield is an honorary director, the board, Charles Fogal, presented Mac with a winter scene oil painting by well known local artist Wilma Stull. Wilma Stull was a former teacher at Chapel Street Public School and taught all of the McGillvray children.

Bill Johnston, editor of the Herald presented Garfield with a caricature portrait by Herald cartoonist Greg Landry. Dave Hastings presented Mac with a plaque which incorporated a copy of the first Herald issue Mac had produced in 1928 and the last issue Mac worked on last week.

William Evdokimoff, on behalf of all the present and past employees of the Georgetown Herald, presented Garfield with a cuff-link and the clip set made from linotype matrices, with which Garfield had worked during his 49 years at the paper.

"I never was much of a speaker, but I would like to thank everyone who took part in arranging this evening for me and to everyone who attended tonight. I never realized I had so many friends," began Garfield.

"I know I'm going to miss it all. I'm going to miss all the fellas and the girls - I remember when it used to be all fellas - but now we have more girls in the back shop than ever before."

"I've met a lot of people through the Herald and I've made a lot of friends through the paper. The Herald and the town have both been good to me. I think the Herald and Georgetown are the greatest," he concluded.

McMillan, 159 Jeffrey Street collided with a car owned by Barry Thompson, RR4 Belwood, Ontario.

Police estimate damage to the Thompson vehicle at \$400 and to the McMillan vehicle at nil.

A snow-covered and slippery roadway on Churchhill 400 feet south of Longfield Road was the scene of an accident January 29, at 3:30 p.m. when a car driven by William Nicholuk, 35A Church Acton was in collision with a car driven by John Kirkwood, RR4 Acton.

Police estimate damages to the Sweeting vehicle at \$600 and to the Pierce vehicle at \$400.

Halton farmers oppose 500kV hydro route

The directors of the Halton Federation of Agriculture met for their monthly meeting in the Agricultural Office, Milton, on Thursday, January 22 with Harold Middlebrook as chairman. Considerable discussion took place on the proposed hydro route cutting south through Limehouse and Milton.

The following motion was passed by the directors and is to be sent to the various members of parliament for Halton:

"The Halton Federation of Agriculture supports the interested Citizens Group and finds it impossible to accept the decision of the ministry of energy for Ontario Hydro to begin work in the south end of the Bradley Junction-to-Milton Hydro Corridor without an independent study. The report

of the Environmental Hearing Board held at Hillsburgh in 1975 shows the need for an independent study which the interested Citizens Group ask for and with which the Halton Federation of Agriculture concurs."

Ontario Hydro are now in the process of approaching persons or leasing of the land for the corridor. If you as a land owner require assistants re-

negotiating with Ontario Hydro, the IFA advises you to get in touch with your Halton Federation of Agriculture. If there is sufficient interest a public meeting will be held where detailed information can be obtained re negotiating with Ontario Hydro. The Ontario Federation of Agriculture have had many years experience in this field and have very qualified personnel to come to these meetings.

Walter Scott, RR3 Georgetown, was present at the Halton Federation meeting to discuss the impact of Ontario Hydro on farming, people, and electrical appliances. Walter has carried out a lot of research on this matter and impressed upon the Halton directors the magnitude of impact that the hydro corridor can have on the community.
