After repeated fire calls answered by the Halton Hills Fire Department to attend burned out furnace motors, Georgetown's Fire Chief Ken Buikema lasues a warning to all homeowners to maintain the furnace motor in their homes as recommended by the oil companies.

Chief Buikema advises that proper maintenance procedures should be carried out at a minimum at the beginning and end of the heating season.

On Saturday, February 7 the fire department answered a call to 4 Glencrest Road for a burned out furnace motor and also answered a call on Monday, February 9 to 438 Delrex Blvd. for the same

Minor damages were caused to a car along the Eighth Line north of the 22 Sideroad as a result of fire. Also on the same day, Friday, the fire depart-ment answered a late afternoon call to a truck fire in front of 71 Main Street South in Georgetown.

Early Friday morning, at 6 a.m. fire officials investigated a complaint made by the Halton Regional Police Force who thought they recognized the smell of fuel oil in the .downtown section. Nothing was discovered during the investigation.

The Acton Fire Department only answered only one call this past week that to the home of Martin VanderBeen on Lot 19, Con. 1 along RR4 in Acton. The Tuesday Feb. 3 morning call came at 3:15 am as a result of a fire which started in the walls behind the fireplace. An estimated \$2,500 was done to the living room and roof of the house. Firemen returned to the fire hall at approximatley

4:30 that morning. The VanderBeen's were able to remain in their home.
