

It was all Georgetown at Haltons

Everything came together for the GDHS wrestling Rebels last Thursday at the Halton Championships, held at M.M. Robinson High School in Burlington, and head coach Bob McKay would have been justified in thinking, "How sweet it is."

In dual meets and invitational this year, the Rebels didn't do as well as they have in the past, mainly because the team went through a rash of injuries and McKay, because of circumstances and design, gave his rookies the job of carrying the main load for the team.

As a result, some criticism was levelled at the team's performance record and naturally, this didn't sit too well with the coaching staff.

The Rebels wanted the Halton Championships badly and more than proved how capable they are as they literally mopped up the floor

with their opponents. They dominated the championships so completely that second place Nelson finished more than a hundred points back of the Rebels.

Georgetown finished with 147 points, Nelson had 39 points and third place, White Oaks, compiled 26 points.

Of the 15 weight categories, the Rebels won 10, while taking six seconds and a third. Twenty-one Georgetown wrestlers competed in the Haltons and fully 17 qualified for the Peel-Halton Championships.

Individual champions for the Rebs included, Frank Lenksi at 83 lbs., Rick Rodgers at 98 lbs., Bill Fournier at 106 lbs., Pat Fobert at 130 lbs., Wayne Martin at 141 lbs., John Pendergast at 157 lbs., Gavin Strachan at 168 lbs., Steve Turner at 178 lbs., Andy Camman at 194 lbs., and Bill Leader at Heavyweight.

Finishing just one rung below the champs, were Brian Pendergast at 90 lbs., Peter Fournier at 98 lbs., Dave Paterson at 106 lbs., Ted Phillips at 115 lbs., Victor Farkas at 123 lbs., and Peter Milne at 136 lbs.

Brent Collier finished third at 148 lbs.

Bill Bradley, who suffered a shoulder injury several weeks ago and who was unable to compete in the Halton, learned just how highly he is regarded in area wrestling circles just prior to the start of the championships. Coach McKay went into the coaches meeting to request that Bill be allowed a bye into the Peel-Haltons. The precedent had been set last year for just such a request but McKay was by no means certain that his wished would be met.

He need not have worried, because the Halton coaches unanimously agreed to allow

the Georgetown wrestler into the Peel-Haltons. Bill finished second in his weight class in the province last year and third the year before, so his credentials had already been established to the various coach's satisfaction. It was a very complimentary gesture, but unfortunately, Bill's shoulder is still not right and he finds himself in the same situation for the Peel-Haltons.

McKay will have to approach the Peel-Halton area coaches to allow Bill to challenge the top two wrestlers in his weight class at this championship and it is to be hoped that they will allow his request.

The Peel-Haltons will be held this Thursday at Clarkson High School in Mississauga and only the top two wrestlers in each weight class will qualify for All-Ontario competition.

Fourth place in the league standings was at stake last Thursday as the GDHS Senior Rebels journeyed to Oakville for a game with OTHS. However, it was just not to be as the Rebs came up somewhat flat and were dumped, 78-63.

OTHs jumped out to an early 14-0 lead, led 42-30 at halftime and continued their domination in the second half en route to the win.

Mike Stankovitz was really the only bright spot on the floor for Georgetown as he had an outstanding game, hooping a career high, 27 points. Paul Nichol was next in the Rebel scoring parade, hitting for 11 points. Nichol also collected 12 rebounds and this deserves special mention as Paul plays the guard position.

The Rebels played Burlington Central on Tuesday (at press time the score was not available) this Friday at the GDHS gym they host White Oaks while they round out their regular schedule against M.M. Robinson this coming Monday.

Because the Rebels have been accepted into the "AA" category, their league games really can almost be regarded as practice matches. Nevertheless, wins are desired and Costigan is looking for all-out efforts by his players.

The acceptance into the "AA" category has assured the Rebels a crack at an All-Ontario Championship. In this area, only Mayfield and Strathroy are classed as "AA" schools but they have declined to compete with Georgetown.

The All-Ontario will be held in Strathroy during the March break and the Rebels should have more than an even chance of returning home with the championship silverware.

Junior Rebels fail to show in final quarter

The GDHS Junior Rebels displayed all the tendencies that have plagued them throughout this season last week as they lost their fifth game of the year, 56-61. They had a more than even chance to win, couldn't hold onto the lead when they had it and became disorganized under pressure.

Coach Morely Leeking, who certainly has gone through a learning experience this year, was not too harsh on his charges but did express disappointment in their showing. He puts the team's 1-6 record down to inexperience under pressure.

The game against Perdue could almost be divided into two contests. In the first half, Georgetown ate up the visitors' man-to-man defense and led 32-19 when the team went to their dressing rooms at the intermission.

Perdue came out determined to make amends as the second half got underway, while the Rebels seemed content to rest on their opening half laurels. Perdue came up with a tenacious full court press in the third period and it completely demoralized the Rebels.

At three-quarter time the Rebel lead had been sliced to two points, 43-41, and Perdue continued their domination in the final period to take the win.

In attempting to stem the Perdue onslaught, three Rebs, Paul Krowchuk, Norm Ilnki and Grady Lenksi, became a bit over zealous and fouled out, so leading into the crucial last few minutes, the homeboys were without three mainstays who quite possibly could have changed the game's final outcome. As it was, the Rebs were forced to accept their fifth defeat.

Paul Krowchuk hooped 20 points for the Rebels, while Grady Lenksi chipped in with 19 points.

One bright spot for Georgetown, was the performance of newcomer, John Galbraith. Galbraith is a recent transfer student from Erin and in the brief time that he appeared on the court, he hit for eight points and was impressive.

The Junior Rebels round out their season this Friday, when they host Acton High School. Game time is 5:30 at the GDHS gym. Although the Rebs are closing out their season, the team has been practising hard, in preparation for the Rebel Tournament, to be held March 6, which hopefully will mark the high point of their year.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

BY-LAW NO. 74-51

The Hearing before the Ontario Municipal Board commencing on Monday, the 15th day of March, 1976 will determine whether or not restricted area By-law 74-51 for the Corporation of the Town of Halton Hills should be approved in whole or in part and whether or not amendments should be made to the By-law.

Restricted area By-law 74-51 is a comprehensive zoning by-law affecting all those lands now within the boundaries of the Town of Halton Hills that were formerly part of The Corporation of the Township of Esquesing. By-law 74-51 provides for the zoning of the lands within the former Township of Esquesing and in so doing regulates the uses which may be made of these lands.

The zoning categories covered by the comprehensive zoning by-law and the uses which may be made in each category are set out in detail in the by-law but include provision for rural, residential, commercial, industrial and open space uses.
