An emergency meeting of the Georgetown branch of the Red Cross was held Monday night after branch president John Wickens had delivered to him by the Ontario Provincial Police on Sunday an appeal from the national Red Cross to help raise relief funds for victims of the Guatemala earthouake.

To help raise a portion of the \$500,000 pledged by the National Red Cross Society, half of which they hope will come from Ontarlo, Wickens told the Herald arrangements are being made with local banks where donations will be received until Friday, February 27.

During the meeting, held at the society's office in Cedarvale Community Centre, members of the executive committee expressed concern that the appeal to help an estimated one million homeless and almost 65,000 injured Guatemalans came on the eveof the Georgetown and District Red Cross branch's own fund-raising drive which gets underway March I.

The monles raised will be used to buy medicine, food, blankets, tents and medical equipment for the stricken Guatemalans. Wickens sald.

Latest reports from Guatemala indicate the death toll to 19,000 with that figure expected to rise as contact is made with more outlying areas.
