Thompsons threaten in semi-finals with Norval

Playoff time in any league, and in any sport tends to bring out the best and the story emerging from semifinal play in the Georgetown Industrial Hockey League is no exception as the four teams are involved in a knockdown, dragout fight to decide who will enter the finals for the league championship.

Norval took the regular season title, but after winning the opening game in their semifinal with Thompson Construction now find themselves battling to stay alive as Thompson tied the Red Machine two weeks ago and then eked out a 2-1 win last Sunday to deadlock the series at three points apiece.

Sandhill appeared to have their series with Royal Pizza Kings well in hand, winning the opening two games, but had to battle back to gain a 2-2 tie last Sunday. Sandhill currently leads this series by a 5-1 point lead.

Goaltending came to the fore in the opening 40 minutes of Sunday's Norval-Thompson game and the score stood at 0-0 as the teams retired to their respective dressing rooms after the second period.

Pat Shanks finally ended the collective scoring drought to give Thompsons a 1-0 lead at the 3:24 mark of the third. Eight minutes later, Keith Peacock counted and Thompsons jumped into a 2-0 lead.

Max Korzack put Norval back into contention with a goal at the 14:55 mark but Thompsons held on to notch their first win of the series.

The Royal Pizza Kings, in attempting to pick up their first series win, controlled play for almost a full 40 minutes. Jim Davies and Bob McDonald gave the Kings a 2-0 lead but unfortunately they couldn't maintain the pace and Alan Craig narrowed the lead to 2-1 at the 18:55 mark of the second period.

Just three minutes into the final stanza, Bob Craig gained the eventual tie for Sandhill.

Sandhill's John Thompson leads the playoff scoring parade with five points on two goals and three assists, while Norval's Larry Bradley is right behind with four points on a goal and three assists.

This Sunday, Norval meets Thompsons at 9:45 a.m. and Sandhill takes on Royal Pizza Kings in the 11:15 game. Both games are to be played at the Gordon Alcott Memorial arena.

Masson swims to gold

The Chinguacousy Swim Club, which counts six Georgetown youngsters on its team roster, took part in an Ontario Age Group Championship last weekend in Burlington and one Georgetown swimmer came home with a gold medal. Cathy Masson swam to the first place finish in the 15-17 age group Girls 100 metre fly and won the medal with a time of 1:15.4. Cathy was also fourth in the 200 metre backstroke, recording a time of 2:50.0.

Fee structures and public time use were the two main issues questioned by the general administration committee during a presentation made by Mary McEwen, a member of Halton Hills Recreation Advisory Committee who presented the policies of the Halton Hills Tennis Association of last Monday's meeting of the committee.

The newly formed Halton Hills Tennis Association (H.H.T.A.) incorporates members of the four tennis clubs in Halton Hills; Joseph Gibbons Tennis Club, Acton Tennis Club, Moore Park Tennis Club and the Gordon

Alcott Tennis Club. Councillor Roy Booth questioned the discrepancy in fee structures among the four clubs and the four different tennis court locations.

Mary McEwen explained that the tennis courts in Halton Hills vary and that certain clubs would not justify a high fee because of the present court structures. The Gordon Alcott Tennis Club fees are the highest of all four clubs.

Because of the four courts located there various special programs can be carried out on these courts resulting in the

need of a slightly higher fee rate. The current fee structure for the four clubs as stated in the submitted policy are: Joseph Gibbons, family, \$8, adult (18 and over), \$4 and junior \$2.50; Acton, family \$15, adult \$8, intermediate \$4 and junior \$2.50; Moore Park, family \$8, adult \$4 and juniors \$2.50; Gordon Alcott, family \$15, adult \$8.50 and juniors \$5.

Mrs. McEwen said that after inquiring about rates of other town tennis clubs, those established in the policy for the H.H.T.A. are the lowest as
