# Hit and runs taking their toll

A Georgetown woman was hospitalized in a traffic accident this past week. Alice McPherson, 56 Queen St., was taken to Georgetown District Memorial Hospital last Tuesday following a mishap with a car driven by Doris Bertram of 97 King St. in front of the Bertram residence. Georgetown and District Hospital report that Mrs. McPherson, who was on foot at the time of the accident, is in satisfactory condition and has no serious injuries. An unknown driver struck a parked car owned by Ernest G. Allen, 161 Prince Charles Dr., Wednesday at the Georgetown Market Place. Police estimate damage to Allen's vehicle at \$100. A car owned by Garfield Laforet, 72 Sargent Road, was parked at 347 Guelph St., Feb. 18 at 8:30 p.m. when it was struck by an unknown driver. Police estimate damage to the Laforet vehicle at \$250.

An unknown vehicle struck a parked car owned by Irene Wheeler of L28, CII, Halton Hills on Feb. 22 at 1:15 a.m. while it was parked at 519 Main St. in Glen Williams. Police believe that the unknown car was westbound on Prince St., lost control, struck the Wheeler vehicle, spun around, then struck a picket fence before driving off. ## Man will maintain his own road in order to get a house

## Crosswalks planned for Maple

The request came about after the works committee had received a letter from the Holy Cross Parents Association regarding the inadequacy of sidewalks along Maple Ave. for students walking to the school. At Monday evening's meeting, the committee members discussed the hazards students faced crossing Maple Ave. but they told a delegation of two from the Holy Cross Parents Association that the matter of making the route safer for children would be coming up later on the agenda. The committee later passed a recommendation from town engineer Robert Austin that pedestrian crosswalks be installed at all locations that have crossing guards now and to retain the crossing guards. Austin said Halton Hills had been waiting on Oakville and Burlington to make such a move but as those two towns were not preceded as quickly as had been first anticipated

**Grader repairs costly**

Estimates for the cost of repairing Halton Hills grader 101 range from a minimum of \$10,000 to a maximum of \$20,000, town engineer Robert Austin told the works committee Monday night. He said that \$10,000 would purchase a new engine, a circle and T-bar and tires and that to get a used or reconditioned grader would not be possible for less than \$20,000. He told the works committee that the town could manage with its three other graders by re-arranging the schedule of the trucks. He suggested that the committee forestall a decision now and wait to see how grader 102 stands up during summer and fall grading. Subsequently, the committee decided to park the first vehicle and wait to see what happens.
