Grader repairs costry

Estimates for the cost of repairing Halton Hills grader 101 range from a minimum of \$10,000 to a maximum of \$20,000, town engineer Robert Austin told the works committee Monday night.

He said that \$10,000 would purchase a new engine, a circle and T-bar and tires and that to get a used or reconditioned grader would not be possible for less than \$20,000.

He told the works committee that the town could manage with its three other graders by re-arranging the schedule of the trucks. He suggested that the committee forestall a decision now and wait to see how grader 102 stands up during summer and fall grading.
