fish follow a channel to get there" a weed bar" a rock shelf? These things will determine whether or not there will be fish there the next time you go to that fabulous spot where you got that lunker, or the limit.

An example, in the spring, fish will move to the north shore of a lake (or even a river). The sun is low on the southern borizon, and the sun exposure, coupled with prevailing winds, produce warmer temperatures on these northern shores. The prevailing winds are from the north and this creates cold water to the south or the downwind side. This applies when the sun is out and weather is good. Try it, you may find that it is one thing to help you enjoy ONTARIO OUTDOORS.






