# The Garbage Gamble

"The Great Garbage Gamble" has come to Halton. A challenge that began between an environmentalist and minister of the environment, George Kerr, has been issued to all Halton councillors. The challenge for the councillors, simply put, is to cut their garbage output down to two bags of garbage per week, per household. Terry Mannell, regional councillor from Oakville, is expected to formally issue the challenge at today's (Wednesday's) Halton regional council meeting. A similar challenge was recently issued to MPP Kerr. At \$50 per MPP the challenge is that Kerr cannot get 30 of his fellow MPP's to cut down their weekly garbage output to two bags per week. Halton Hills and Halton councillors will also be challenged to establish compost heaps for their garbage as well as to use returnable containers as much as possible and to resist over-packaged goods. The councillors will also be accepting a challenge on behalf of their wives as they will be asked to begin more careful purchasing techniques. No money is involved in Councillor Mannell's challenge to the local representatives.

# Petrofina stalled in bid for self-serve

Petrofina tried to pump a little extra information from town council Monday night about their chances of getting their gasoline station at the corner of Mountainview Road and Guelph Street turned into a self-serve operation.

But all they discovered from their efforts was that their plans will have to remain stalled until the planning board carries out its complete investigation of the pros and cons of self-serve gas bars in comparison to full service stations.

Two marketing representatives of Petrofina, Dennis Morton and Bill Reid, were on hand for the meeting to present their request that the indefinite moratorium on self-serves be lifted to permit their station's changeover.

When questioned about the safety of self-serves, Mr. Reid stated, "In actual fact a self-serve operation is much safer than a normal type of outlet." A "panic button" would completely shut down the pumps' operations in case of an emergency at a self-serve station while normal stations have no such emergency equipment, he said.

Councillors, however, remained unimpressed. They upheld their earlier decision to seek all the facts prior to making any decisions either way or whether more self-serves should be permitted and, if so, how many.

# Board approves moves

Mrs. Catherine McDewitt was granted a permanent contract with the North Education Centre effective the first of this year.

A car driven by Janice K. Gordon, 127 Wynford Place, Acton, was in collision with a car driven by Maurice Wilson, 17 Arletta St., Georgetown, at 185 Guelph St. on Feb. 22 at 1:45 p.m.

Police estimate damages to the Wilson vehicle at \$900 and to the Gordon vehicle at \$700. A car driven by John A. Buchanan, 17 Windsor Rd., Georgetown was in collision with a car driven by James H. Murphy, 57 Duncan Dr. on Feb. 22 at 4:45 p.m. The accident happened at a curve on Regional Rd. 32, one-half-mile east of the Eighth Line.

Damage to the Papillon vehicle was \$100, police estimate while the Hall vehicle sustained \$200 in damages. The intersection of Steeles Ave. and Trafalgar Rd. was the scene of an accident Feb. 26 at 6:45 a.m. when a car driven by Cosimo Geracitano of Downsview was in collision with a car driven by Maragete Roth of Grand Valley.

Damage to the Roth vehicle was \$500 and \$150 to the Geracitano vehicle, police estimate. The Milton turnoff (Halton Rd. 3A) on Trafalgar Rd. was the scene of an accident Feb. 25 at 1:15 p.m. when the car driven by Keith W. Shantz of Plattsville failed to negotiate the curve and knocked down five guide poles on the median strip. Volunteer fireman had to be called out to wash the roadway clean of gasoline which came from the ruptured gas tank.

Police estimate damage to the Shantz vehicle at \$700 and to the five guide poles at \$125. A single car mishap on Feb. 25 at 1:55 a.m. in Glen Williams caused \$25 in damages to a car driven by Patricia Gartshore of London and \$75 in damages to a picket fence owned by Irene Wheeler.

An unknown car struck a parked car owned by Wayne A. Martin of Esquimaux Township in the GDHS parking lot last Wednesday and caused \$300 in damages.
