## The Garbage Gamble

"The Great Garbage Gamble" has come to Halton.

A challenge that began between an evnironmentalist and minister of the environment, George Kerr, has been issued to all Halton councillors.

The challenge for the councillors, simply put, is to cut their garbage output down to two bags of garbage per week, per household. Terry Mannell, regional councillor from Oakville, is expected to formally issue the

challenge at today's (Wednesday's) Halton regional council meeting. A similar challenge was recently issued to MPP Kerr. At \$50 per MPP the challenge is that Kerr cannot get 30 of his fellow MPP's to cut down their weekly garbage output to two

bags per week. Halton Hills and Halton councillors will also be challenged to establish compost heaps from their garbage as well as to use returnable containers as much as possible and to resist over-packaged goods. The councillors will also be accepting a challenge on behalf of

Mannell's challenge to the local represen-

"All committments by council members will be subject to the continuous scrutiny of the press and the public, with results to be reported by the target date of June 30."

Mannell explained. Councillor Mannell also calls for a regional bylaw controlling the availability of non-returnable containers for products which are available in returnable containers. A similar bylaw has been passed by the city of London.

He also calls for a petition to the province "urging immediate enactment of legislation requiring the use of returnable containers wherever possible and particularly initiating a program for the production of returnable. containers from all domestic liquors handled by the Liquor Control Board, plus a provincial review of packaging methods which will lead to standards that will ensure the most environmentally acceptable methods and materials are used, and introduction of legislation which will discourage the




