Jr. Rebels fall in their own tourney

"The Rebel", a Junior basketball Invitational tournament, held centre stage at the GDHS gym this past Saturday. Unfortunately for the host team, the Junior Rebels, they ran into two hot teams and at the same time were plagued by the same inconsistencies that had tormented them during their 1975 regular season.

The Rebels lost their opening game, 63-56, to Cobourg then advanced into the consolation semifinal against Dunnville. The locals, although pressed at times, ousted Dunnville, 64-57 and entered the consolation final against Woodlands High School of Mississauga. In the final, Woodlands' superiority was obvious right from the start and the Rebels were downed, 68-57.

The tournament was an extremely smooth running affair, thanks mainly to the effort put into organizing the event by Reb coach Morley Leeking. The tourney went as scheduled, little if any criticism was heard about any aspect of the day and, although their championship hopes didn't materialize, the Junior Rebels closed out their year in fine fashion.

The Rebs eventually persevered for a 64-57 win.

In the consolation championship, the Rebs were obviously tired and their game lacked its usual punch. They dropped behind, 19-11 after the first quarter and were out of it by halftime as Woodlands built up a 54-31 lead. Both teams employed their bench for most of the second half, with the final score reading, 68-57, Woodlands. Grady Lenski again paced the Rebel attack. He hit for 17 points while Paul Krowchuk hooped 13 points.

The tournament marked the end of the season for the Rebels but heralded promise for next year. The East-Haltons officially marked the beginning of the trek to All-Ontario honours, as to advance from them a gymnast had to meet certain qualifications.

Lorrie Maglaughan led her Intermediate gymnastic mates as she was third on the vault and seventh on beam. Val Phillips was fourth on the vault and eighth on beam. Laura Yerxa placed fourth on the beam and eighth on floor, while Marianne Nemeth was sixth on the beam and Sheryl Farlotte took eighth place on the bars.

The GDHS Juniors were the team champions in their division, led by Sandy Waxford, who placed sixth on the bars, seventh on both the beam and the vault and was second all-round.

Lee Johnston was second on beam, fourth on floor and sixth on vault. Jane Kerby garnered her team valuable points by placing third on the vault.



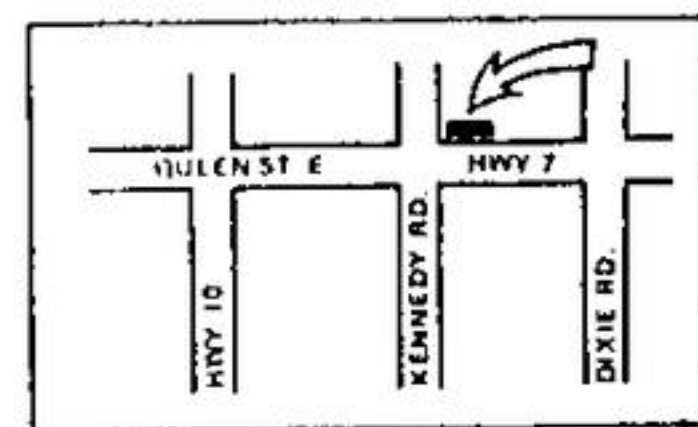
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
