# Wolf reports exaggerated

A meeting was held with the residents of the Restoule area, and the ministry of natural resources and it has been decided to amend the Ontarlo fishery regulations. The area that covers part of the Restoule River and Restoule Lake will now be a sanctuary.

This area is between Hwy 534 and the line between Concession 3 and 4 in the Township of Patterson in the district of Parry Sound. It will be closed March 1 to June 1 and legislation is expected to be passed soon.

Many lakes now have a layer of slush on them, making travel by snowmobile or on foot difficult. Numerous air holes may be concealed by the snow that has fallen and cannot readily be discovered until too late. This situation will prevail until milder, snow free weather permits the slush to work up to the surface, then freeze with colder weather. Take not and take care on the ice. This is not a warning to keep off, just to take care.

Reports of wolves between Vermillion Bay and the border of Manitoba are apparently exaggerated. The minister natural resources, Leo Bernier, says that the recent aerial survey showed only seven moose kills in 45 hours of the survey. This is one indication that the wolf population is not too high. When the weather improves then a new survey will be taken, and a much more accurate count can be arrived at.

If this survey shows more than one wolf per 10 to 15 miles, then control measures will be taken said the minister. Wolf pelts have been getting an average of \$72 on the North Bay fur market with a high of \$225. This should be an incentive to trappers to take and thereby control the welves in a natural way, said the minister.
