10 years later Harry's still organizing

Ten years ago, when the Kinsmen Club of Georgetown took over the organizational end of the Georgetown International Bantam Hockey Tournament, at the request of a group headed by wellknown hockey enthusiast, Red Asseltine, Harry Levy agreed to take over the chairman's position on an interim basis.

The 1976 tournament is now upon us and lo and behold, Mr. Levy is still the driving force behind the event.

The tournament was initiated in 1961 but really came into its own and began to attract provincial, national and even international attention with the introduction of the Kinsmen into the affair. In no small way, this is due to the chairmanship provided by Harry Levy.

Harry is a well respected member of the Georgetown community, serves on town council and is held in high esteem by his fellow Kinsmen. He never approaches a job in half measures and it is for this reason that the Bantam Tournament has flourished.

Harry originally became involved in the tournament because of the organizational challenge. Tournament preparations officially get underway at least six months in advance and from this point on, Harry finds himself slowly, but surely, immersed in the project.

From the scrutinizing of available teams, to the mailing of invitations even to ensuring that teams from distant communities have compatible schedules requires individual attention and these duties are bequeathed to the realm of Harry Levy.

The tournament, under Mr. Levy's direction, has been praised as "the most highly organized administrative tournament in Canada" and teams that have competed here have regularly endorsed this statement.

An undertaking that takes months of preparation usually runs itself once the preliminaries are dealt with. Harry Lovy is not a believer of this school of thought,


